

A first class auctioneer will be furnished by the fair directors. All stock must be registered or pure bred, and listed on or before Sept. 25. Subscriptions will be circulated about the county immediately for the purpose of raising funds for the fair this year. The business men of Jamestown have agreed to pay a dollar for every dollar raised in the county, and with this plan it is hoped to raise sufficient funds. The next meeting will be held on July 1, at which time the question of races, sports, and advertising will be considered. All plans are being made for a big fair this year.
