

Valley City Boys Will Fare Well in Their Border Camp

Kingsville, Texas, July 26.—The North Dakota regiment figured in a train wreck near Odem, Texas, this morning, when one section backed on the wye into another section. Two cars were damaged, but no injury of any kind was reported by any of the men.

The second and third battalions consolidated at Odem, near Corpus Christi, this morning and will arrive at their destination this afternoon. Everybody is well and happy.

Washington, July 26.—The senate today took action to create a means whereby the militiamen may cast their votes in the border camps at the November election. This is taken to indicate that the guardsmen will remain there until December.

North Dakota troops will be well fed while in the service. Uncle Sam allows each man 24c per day. There is a slight difference between the field and garrison allowance: A larger quantity of food is allowed in the garrison and a greater variety.

The United States army rations is the most liberal in the world. The garrison allowance consists of 20 ounces of fresh beef, 16 ounces of bread, 2 1/2 ounces of beans, 20 ounces of potatoes, 1 1/4 ounces of prunes, 1 1/2 ounces of coffee, 3 1/2 ounces of sugar, 1/2 ounce evaporated milk, vinegar, salt, pepper, cinnamon, lard, butter, syrup and flavoring extract.

Ordinarily in the garrison flour is issued in place of bread as 18 ounces of flour will run about 22 ounces of bread. The saving on the flour allowance is used to purchase delicacies, especially jam, of which the soldiers are exceedingly fond.

On holidays the troops are allowed 20 ounces of turkey in place of the beef ration.

Mercedes, Texas, the destination and probable place of encampment of the members of Company G, is a small town situated in the southeastern corner of Texas, in Hidalgo county. The town has a population of about 1,200, and is on the St. Louis, Brownsville and Mexican railway. It is in a truck growing district and is given as a health resort. Among the industries is a brick yard, cement block factory, cotton gins and grist mills. It is not far from Brownsville, on the Gulf of Mexico.

Mercedes is several miles from the Rio Grande river. The largest town to the northwest is Laredo. Across the river from Mercedes are the Mexican states of Nuevo Leon and Tamaulipas. Matamoras is the principal town in this Mexican state and a railroad runs on the south bank of the Rio Grande river. The whole region is tributary to the Gulf of Mexico, is a fertile, flat and very hot portion of Texas. Tropical fruit and early vegetations grow in profusion. It is also a fine cotton growing region.


