Fargo, Sept. 26.—Fargo is to get a new factory.

Albert Hoiland, inventor and manufacturer of the Hoiland wild oat separator, is to erect a new factory building in which his separator will be manufactured hereafter at 1221 Front street. It is to be constructed of wood with metal covering, the estimated cost of the building alone being \$6,000.

A building permit was issued by the city inspector to Mr. Hoiland yesterday and work on the new building is to be started at once. The building will be a two story, about 100 feet by 200 feet, the usual machine shop type. It is to be equipped with all the latest machinery needed in the production of the Hoiland separator.
