Child's Body Found in Smoking Ruins of Building

On returning from a short automobile ride to find a small barn on their premises burned to the ground, and the dead body of their four and a half year old boy, "Jack" Robert, lying in the smoking ruins, was the shock suffered by Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Bemis who reside at 214 Crescent avenue Valley City, Monday afternoon.

The fire department had been called to the scene of the conflagration, the first call in 80 days, and had saved a couple of smaller buildings. Inquiry was made by Fire Chief Wm. Craswell as to the whereabouts of the little fellow, and had been informed that he was out for a ride with his parents.

PRICES LESS THAN PRODUCTION COST

That North Dakota farmers at the present time are receiving less than 40 per cent of the cost of production for their grain crops, is the statement made by H. B. Fuller of Fargo secretary of the North Dakota Farm Bureau Federation.

"This statement is based on the data secured by Rex E. Willard, farm account specialist at the North Dakota Agricultural College, from 619 farms in the state last year," declared Mr. Fuller.

Below is a table showing the crops, cost of production per bushel, price per bushel at Fargo on Tuesday, April 13, and the percentage of the cost of production which the farmer would receive if he sold at that day.

SLICK SWINDLER WORKS FARMERS
