Don't kill lady-bugs, the small brown beetle with two black spots on its back, is the advice given out by A. F. Yeager, horticulturist at the Agricultural College. These bugs are killing plant lice, the small green worm that eats leaves on trees and is also found on other plants, Mr. Yeager says. The lady bugs are more numerous than usual this season and, so far, are holding the upper hand in their fight against plant lice. The small beetles are ridding the trees of the lice and proving a great aid to plants. The lady-bugs in the growing stage resembles a small alligator and crawls about like a worm. Even at this stage they eat the lice, however, and plant growers are advised not to kill them.

**PRIMARY RETURNS STILL INCOMPLETE**

Fargo, N. D., July 3—There was a mussy of the republican ballots according to the indications on the fifth day after last week's primaries. With Governor R. A. Nestos' majority expected to reach over 10,000 and Lynn J. Frazier reaching 10,000. Nonpartisans today claims that D. A. Poindexter has secured the nomination for state auditor, S. A. Olsness, for commissioner of insurance, Milholland and Harding their indorsees for railroad commission. Also that their

nominee, W. H. Church for commissioner of agriculture and labor, and A. E. Bowman for lieutenant governor is believed. P. A. Garberg has a possible chance for the nomination for attorney general. Independents practically conceded Olsness and Poindexter today but contest the nomination for lieutenant governor, the commissioner of agriculture and attorney general. They announced the nomination of Thomas Hall for secretary of state and John Steen for treasurer. In reply to the Nonpartisan's contentions that they have the majority of the senate and house the independents declare that they have secured enough nominees on both republican and democratic tickets to control both houses thru amalgamation in the fall. Nonpartisans base their claims for lieutenant governor, commissioner of agriculture, attorney general on the following figures at League headquarters: Bowman 43,769, Hyland 47,687 in 1161 precincts. Church 46,642, Kitchen 46,185 in 1920 precincts. Garberg 48,020, Shafer 53,641 in 1221 precincts. In 2028 precincts, McCumber 78,397 and Frazier 87,110, a lead of 8713 for the nonpartisan candidate. Nestos' lead is 13,271 in 2013 precincts. The vote stands Nestos, 90,759 and Baker 777,488.

**LOUIS BACHANT SIGNS AS MANAGER**

Louis Bachant, premier receiver in the old Northern league, a former battery partner of Charley Boardman's and recently manager of the fast Carrington independent team, met with the management of the Hi-Liners this morning and signed a contract as manager for the balance of the season, replacing Menne, temporary manager since Boardman's resignation. Under the contract signed by Bachant he will be absolute manager of the club in all things pertaining to the personnel of the club or the playing, the baseball association to look after the finances of the club.

The baseball association handed his release to Schuler, center fielder this morning. Art Finch requested that his name be placed on the voluntary suspended list and this request was granted. Finch has been suffering from a sore arm for the past two

weeks. It was getting better but he pitched again last week and put his arm in worse shape than ever before. He will be out of his uniform for ten days or two weeks until he gets in shape again and will then again re-join the club.

Louis Bachant will assume the direction of the club in this afternoon's game and will be seen in a Hi-Liner uniform for the first time. When asked at noon if he would do the receiving he stated that he did not know at that time whether he would take an active part in the game or not, his decision depending on circumstances. However, he stated that he would catch, at least one of the games tomorrow afternoon.
