IRISH CABINET PRESIDENT DEAD

London, England, Aug. 12—Arthur Griffith, President of the Irish cabinet under the terms of the peace treaty with England, passed away today from heart failure, it was announced by the colonial office. Griffith was one of the prime authorities in the framing of the treaty with England by which the Free State was created. He supported the treaty in opposition to Eamon DeValera, who at that time, was president of the Irish republic. Following DeValera's resignation after his defeat for the ratification of the treaty Griffiths was elected to take his place as president of the Irish cabinet under the treaty with England. He took the office January 10th, 1922, after the former President had quit. Previous to the negotiations he was a member of the Sinn Fein rebels and was arrested by English troops and put in jail shortly

before the peace negotiations started. He was regarded by many as one of the strongest leaders in Ireland. He was born in Ireland in 1872 and was the son of Arthur Griffith, a printer.

FOUR CONFESS TO KILLING FATHER

Muskogee, Mich., Aug. 12 — Four persons confessed to the slaying of Ralph Hogel and his son. The father was killed on February 4th and the son three months later. Mrs. Madison Hogel, 26, bride of Romme, the son, according to a confession made public, admitted that she killed her father-in-law. "He was so old and feeble, I decided I ought to kill him", she said, according to the authorities. "I put a small drop of arsenic into his coffee at noon and he died shortly afterwards, just as he was going to carry in an armful of wood". Mrs. Alice, the girl's mother and her brothers, Lee and Herman, all admitted complicity in the killing of the younger Hogel, officials said. A farm hand is alleged to have had a hand in the killing of the younger son but says that he is innocent. He told of the slaying of the younger Hogel. Mrs. Hogel told of her killing her husband. "We had quarreled frequently and he was lying on a cot. I picked up a rolling pin and hit him on the head as hard as I could. My brother was nearby and Romme was still alive and he hit him over the head. We then called mother, Herman and the hired man and they took him in a wagon and put a harness strap about his neck to make it look like he killed himself". Neighbors formed a lynching party and had ropes around the necks of Lee and Herman and when they contended that the hired man killed the younger Hogel. They are all being held for trial.

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
