SCARLET FEVER CONTROL

Scarlet fever is prevailing to an undue extent in several parts of North Dakota. According to the State Board of Health the unchallenged presence of this disease is regrettable because such unnecessary sickness and premature death will inevitably result unless vigorous repressive measures are instituted. An understanding of certain fundamental principles will do much to reduce the heavy toll exacted by scarlet fever.

"The well developed case of scarlet fever is readily recognized" says the statement of the Board. "However, the real danger arises from the mild cases which are frequently not recognized as scarlet fever yet are responsible for the spread of the disease. Merely because a case is mild is no reason for regarding it lightly. The infection from such a case often assumes a more virulent aspect when communicated to other persons. The vast majority of scarlet fever cases result from contact between the sick and the well. Occasionally milk plays a part in transferring the infection.

"The process of discovering the particular person responsible for the spread of scarlet fever," continues the statement of the board, "depends upon the fact that the individual most likely to acquire the disease are those who have been most intimately in contact with an actual case. Thus, by determining who were the close associates of the scarlet fever patient it is frequently possible to discover persons with peeling skin, strawberry tongue, sore throat, reddened throat or discharging ears, but whose condition was not previously recognized as being scarlet fever.

In certain instances the symptoms may have been so mild or fleeting as to have been overlooked. It is entirely possible that these so-called "mild" cases serve as carriers of the disease. In searching for carriers it is well to reinspect patients who have been released from quarantine. When such persons show evidence of sore or red throat or discharge from the ear they should be regarded as potential sources of danger.

"When scarlet fever is present in a community," concludes the statement of the Board, "all suspicious cases should be isolated until a diagnosis can be made. 'Isolation first and diagnosis afterwards' is an excellent protective measure. The placarding of homes in which scarlet fever is SUSPECTED of being present is also a procedure of distinct value. Scarlet fever is a dangerous affection and stringent measures looking to its elimination are always warranted.

During the Barnes County Institute held in Valley City October 16th to 21st there was on exhibit a group of splendid health posters, many of which were made by children in the rural schools of this county at the suggestion of Miss Work, county nurse. The time of year, when hot school lunches are considered necessary, is fast approaching. That more rural teachers might become interested a demonstration was given, showing the preparation of a hot lunch as it is actually made in the rural school house. A discussion followed and many helpful questions were answered and those who had had experience, gave their methods and ideas. Miss Work is ambitious to have hot school lunches served in all rural schools in the county, during the winter months, believing that they would make for better mental as well as better physical health of the children. Those teachers who have tried it are very enthusiastic about its results.
