GOOD ROADS DAY WILL PROVE BIG ATTRACTION; D. WARD KING SPEAKS

"Good Roads Without Money" is the Slogan of His Nation Wide Campaign—He Hopes to Meet Many Prominent Men of the County Here.

Final preparations are being made for the good roads meeting which is to be held here Thursday afternoon, when D. Ward King, inventor and demonstrator of the split-log drag, will lecture. The meeting, which promises to be one of the most important of its kind ever held in the city, will be held at the city hall, beginning at 1:30 o'clock. If the attendance is great enough, the meeting will be held at the auditorium on North Fifth street. The feature of Mr. King's meeting will be the demonstration of road building and road improving. If the demonstration probably will be given on one of the streets near by. The committee in charge probably will select a road tomorrow. Mr. King is one of the greatest good roads authorities in the country, and his appearance here is of great importance to the county. Mr. King is in great demand for road demonstration work, and the local people are fortunate in securing his services. Mr. King formerly was in the good roads work of the United States government. The road laws of six states have been changed to conform to his ideas of proper road construction and road repair and maintenance. The local committees are putting forth every effort to make the meeting

a big success. Township officials, who will be here tomorrow for their organization meeting, will be urged to remain over for the King meeting. The East Grand Forks Commercial club will be invited to participate in the gathering. Local business men are being urged to take part. In a letter to Secretary C. W. Graves of the Commercial club, Mr. King discusses the meeting in Grand Forks. He says: "I am writing to urge the attendance of individuals from every class of citizens at our road drag meetings. I especially desire the presence of the thoughtful leaders of public opinion. No matter how thoroughly your road officials may be convinced they cannot (and will not) act unless backed by the public opinion of the community. Let me face an active man from each bank and business house; at least once. I crave a hearing from your ministers—physicians, lawyers—best can mold sentiment. In many towns the high school attends. The leaders and road builders of tomorrow are there. "Persuade advertisers to note and comment on the 'Split-Log Drag Rally' in their display ads in all newspapers—let them begin with the next issue and run them until after the meeting. The effect is excellent. I am hoping for a big mass meeting of your most intelligent citizens."
