McLOUGHLIN IS TENNIS FAVORITE

Betting Favors Him in the Match Against Williams For the Title.

Newport, R. I., Sept. 1.—History repeated itself on the Casino today yesterday when Maurice E. McLoughlin of San Francisco and R. Norris Williams II of Philadelphia won their place in the finals of the all-comers tournament for the national singles lawn tennis championship.

The betting last night was 4 to 1 that McLoughlin would capture the title today for the third time. The odds were somewhat shorter on Williams' ability to take a set from the champion, as he did in the finals last year.

McLoughlin won his place in the finals by defeating former champion William J. Clothier of Philadelphia, in straight sets, 6-4, 6-4, 6-2. Williams came through with a similar victory over Ella Fottrell of San Francisco, 6-4, 6-2, 6-2.

Of the two winners, the playing of Williams was the more impressive. He handled fearlessly Fottrell's terrific service, the most severe seen on the Casino courts this year, not excepting that of McLoughlin. It took him nearly a set, however, to fathom the drives. After that Williams speeded up his own service until he obtained as many aces as Fottrell. The Californian's only attack was his service. He was weak at the net, covered court poorly and lacked generalship.

Clothier played his usual careful, deliberate game against McLoughlin and ran the first set up to four games to four, when McLoughlin jumped in and took the next three games in succession. The champion had a bad slump in the second set, driving to the net repeatedly. Clothier still playing conservatively, obtained an ever larger lead before McLoughlin, with the set four games to one against him, rallied and swept through the next five games with the loss of only four points.

FRANK MAYER, EAST SIDE PLAYER, TO TRY OUT FOR MINNESOTA U ELEVEN

Carl Connolly, Devils Lake Man, Also to Make Trial For Gopher Team—Doc Williams Has Great Deal of New Material.

Frank Mayer of East Grand Forks will be a candidate again this fall for a position on the Minnesota university football squad. He expects to try out for a line job. Mayer attended the Gopher instate last year and made a fine showing in football, but was not picked for the first squad. It is expected, however, that he will make a strong bid for a place this year. Mayer is a big fellow with long legs and a good deal of speed. He is a graduate of the East Grand Forks high school and was a "star" man when in school there.

Carl Connolly of Devils Lake has also decided to attend the same university and will be a candidate for the Gopher team. It is not known yet what position he will go for.

Heavy Loss. Despite Minnesota's heavy loss in experienced football candidates for the 1914 team, due to graduation and other causes, Dr. H. L. Williams, head coach, will have thirty-five or more men on Northrop field on Sept. 19 who have had a taste of Minnesota football training. Second team candidates, freshmen and green players who turned out for spring work make up the list. New candidates will probably double the number.

The number of eligibles was further depleted when it was learned yesterday that Ostrom, the giant guard on last year's squad, was out of it because of trouble with his studies. Snyder, a promising line man of last year's team, is also in scholastic difficulty as to eligibility, and the same is true of Art Erdahl, who was expected to make a strong bid for the quarterback job. Russell Tollefson, one of last year's quarterbacks, may not return. St. Marie, last year a sub end, will not attend Minnesota this fall.

A Small Foundation. The men who saw actual experience in last year's conference games and who will try for the eleven this fall are "Boley" Rosenthal, captain; Loren Solon, Dunnigan B. Bierman and possibly Tollefson. That makes a small nucleus for Dr. Williams to build upon. But the pilot of Minnesota's football destinies foresaw that condition of affairs and last spring instituted the strongest spring football work this season has known. As a consequence a semi-experienced squad will be available for the opening practice of the year.

Recommended by Gilmore Deby and reputed to be one of the best players ever developed in high school football on the Pacific coast, A. J. Quist, who will attempt to land a position on the line.

Two years ago Harry Scholter played on the second team. He will be out again this fall. Charles Kelahan, whose brother played football at Minnesota several years ago will be in togs for the first practice. Hafferty, another second-team player, and Oscar Anderson of Halleck, Minn., have promised to play. Anderson was on the second team backfield last year. Two athletes from Ellensburg, Wash., J. H. Mundy and M. W. Farrell, worked last spring and will again be on the gridiron.

Dedrick to Try Football. Joe Dedrick, captain of last year's baseball team, has notified Manager Alan McBean that he will apply for an outfit. Other candidates certain of showing up are:

Ingvar Husby, McIntosh, Minn., a second-team man for two years; Moss, last year a sub end; Frank Meyer, East Grand Forks, last year a line candidate; Francis Moudry, Le Sueur Center, Minn.; D. R. Young, Baker, Mont.; last year a line man with the scrubs; Gilbert Sinclair, a scrub last year with a condition to pass out; Gus Parent, Parent, Minn.; and candidate Sigurd Hagen, Underwood, Minn., a line man; A. J. Quist, Everett, Wash., an end; J. M. Sprafka, Perham, Minn.; Carl Connolly, Devils Lake, N. D.

FOWNES MAKES NEW GOLF MARK

WORLD'S RECORDS BROKEN YESTERDAY

Pittsburgh Player Makes a New Record for Amateur Medal Play.

Manchester, Vt., Sept. 1.—Leading a field of 194 golfers, aspirants for national amateur championship honors W. C. Fownes of the Oakmont Golf club, Pittsburgh, set a new record for medal amateur championship play yesterday. His card of 70, returned at the end of the first round of 18 holes qualification play over the links of the Ekwonok Country club, was the lowest ever returned for medal play at an amateur championship meeting in this country.

Fownes, who was national champion in 1910, had an advantage of two strokes over the second best card of a crack field, R. R. Gordon of Braeburn returning a well balanced 72.

Francis Gullet of Woodland, amateur champion of France, and national open champion last year, scored the best performance of the trio of high ranking players, in which Jerome Travers, present amateur title holder and Charles Evans, Jr., of Edgewater also are grouped. Gullet's 73 brought him into a tie for third place. Evans returned a 74 for seventh place and Travers was tied for tenth with a card of 76.

The highest score of the 64 to qualify was 85. Of the 104 starters 96 returned cards.

This morning the qualifiers set out on another round of 18 hole medal play to determine the 32 who will continue at match play in the afternoon. These 32 will come through on the best total scores.

BLAIR PROPERTY OF BALTIMORE
Cincinnati, Sept. 1.—The claim of the Baltimore International league to the services of player John Blair was denied yesterday by the national baseball commission. The Baltimore club claimed that it had entered into an agreement with Blair and that he had accepted them, but admitted that the agreement was not put in writing. Section two of article 8 of the national agreement holds that an agreement made in evidence by a written acceptance and the commission ruled accordingly. Blair has since signed with the New York American league club.

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
