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BITTER FIGHT IN DEMOCRATIC GATHERING

The recent disturbance at the university were matters for lengthy discussion. Scathing denunciations of the alleged meddling of "interests" in the administration of the two schools were made by several.

There was some difference of opinion as to where the blame lay, but it was claimed that influence said to have been exerted against Worst, Bolley and Lad of the A. C. came through the board of trustees, and that the intention was to "kill with the price" these three faculty men, not coming out in the open to oust them, but making their positions so extremely unpleasant that they would be driven out.

The sentiment in one part of the state, as expressed in a telegram which Mr. Hildreth read was that the A. C. should be reorganized, a controlling majority of its board of trustees should always be actual farmers, and not "farmers' friends."

Accuse Farming Association. The Better Farming association was accused of being hand in glove with interests in attempting to obtain control of the agricultural college.

Other Resolutions. The initiative and referendum and recall were endorsed. The committee would reduce the legal rate of interest to six per cent and the contract rate to ten per cent.
