CLUB DIRECTORS DISCUSS QUESTION OF RETAINING FRANCHISE NEXT YEAR

SEVERAL PLANS ARE SUGGESTED

No Definite Action is Taken, However—Another Meeting to be Held.

At a meeting of the directors of the Grand Forks Baseball association last night, the question of whether or not the club shall be represented in the league next year was discussed. Definite action was postponed. Another meeting will be held September 9, when further plans will be considered.

The consensus of opinion is that the club retain its franchise. Several being, however, that too much money has been lost to warrant another year's experience, but, for the most part, the sentiment is in favor of raising money enough to continue.

This has been an unusually hard baseball year throughout the country. Not one of the major leagues has had a successful financial season and minor leagues in various sections have "blown-up" because of a lack of patronage.

So far as Grand Forks is concerned, the team played in ill-luck throughout the season. At the opening, when the team was winning regularly, the weather was poor, and then, when the long slump came, excellent weather was experienced. The result was poor crowds. Then, on their return, the weather was too cold for baseball, and even though they were fighting for third place, the fans did not turn out.

On the other hand, the season has had several results that will be beneficial for next year. Altman was sold to the White Sox, and even though he is not retained after May 10, 1915, the club sets \$500 for him. If the White Sox do not keep him, he will be sold to the Western league, the American association or some other higher class team. Donley, Peters and Larson will remain in the club.

The fact that practically a new team had to be organized this spring made it doubly hard financially. The club now has a nucleus for a winning team next year, and the difficulty of organizing and starting the season would not be nearly so great.

Several plans for handling the situation have been broached, but nothing definite was decided. They will be investigated and considered further at a future meeting.
