TWINS LOSE TO SUPERIOR CREW

Three F-M Pitchers Unable to Hold the Red Sox Down.

Superior, Wis., Sept. 4.—Fargo-Moorhead used three pitchers in a vain attempt to stop Superior yesterday and the home team won 9 to 6.

Superior began the excitement in the second frame when with two runs in and the bases filled by a hit and two passes, Murphy succeeded Hand-schu, who forced in another run. For the next three innings he held Superior to two lone hits, but in the sixth with the bases filled, two down and Glass at bat, he was derailed to make way for Beisser. Glass doubled, scoring two.

In the eighth four hits and a sacrifice fly, almost in a row, netted two more. Murphy on being hit by a pitched ball, Maupin in his double and Cullis on his single, aided by three errors, counted in the third frame. Manes and Dries counting in the sixth on singles aided by errors. A pass, an error and Cullis' sacrifice, enabled Schuler to count on the fifth.

CURLING CLUB HOLDS MEETING

Consider Plan of Taking Over First Organization's Interests.

At a meeting of the Caledonian Curling club last night the question of incorporating the organization and taking over the Owen-Pelletier contract was discussed. The Grand Forks Curling club, of which Owen and Pelletier formerly owned the controlling interest, owns the rink. When the deal whereby Owen and Pelletier left was consummated, J. C. Sheppard became manager and according to the agreement, he is to receive a certain salary and the surplus turned over to the Grand Forks Curling club.

The plan is to do away with this and reorganize entirely, so that the Caledonian club can purchase the rink and have entire charge of it. It is believed that a meeting of the directors of the two clubs will meet soon to discuss the affair. If favorable, a meeting of all the members of the Caledonian club will be called, so they can take final action.

The question of building additional sheets was taken up, but was left for further consideration.

NEW PLAYERS' FRAT IS BEING TALKED

New York, Sept. 4.—A story is going the rounds among the ball players that an effort has been made to form a new players' fraternity among the players of the American league. It is acknowledged by several players that Ira Thomas of the Athletics approached several prominent players to assist them on the plan for a new body to supplant the Pultz organization.

Thomas was expelled from the Players' Fraternity last year for non-payment of dues.

Among the players whom Thomas is said to have approached were officials of the Players' Fraternity, and when they heard of Thomas' suggestion the plan was coolly turned down.

AUTO SPEEDWAY TWIN CITY PLAN

St. Paul, Sept. 4.—Plans for the promotion of two speedways in the twin cities, one backed by twin cities capitalists and the other by a company formed by H. C. Moore of Chicago, progressed yesterday.

The Twin Cities Speedway association met in the office of J. F. Sperry. The speedway, it is said, may be located at Columbia Heights, Minneapolis. Mr. Moore appeared before the directors of the Association of Commerce and it was announced that it has purchased its ground, will let contracts immediately, and work will begin on the course this fall.

The Association of Commerce will send out a committee to investigate the proposition offered by Mr. Moore, and it indicated that it probably would give its indorsement to his efforts.

The speedway probably will be located in the midway district. A race for first opening may develop between the two. Mr. Moore outlined the desirability of a great million-dollar speedway, one that will rival the course in Indianapolis. Pultz promised to develop between the two movements, and it is not at all likely that two courses will be started.

WAIVER PRICE IS GIVEN FOR MARTY

McGraw Gets O'Toole For \$2,500 After Once Offering \$25,000.

New York, Sept. 4.—Marty O'Toole, the pitcher for whom Pittsburgh paid \$22,500 in cash and players in 1912, came to the New York National league club for the waiver price of \$2,500. O'Toole came to New York with the Giants, and may be used in one of the six games which the New Yorks play in Brooklyn this week.

McGraw realizes that the September campaign is going to be a trying ordeal for his boxmen and felt the need of an experienced pitcher to help out the regular staff.

O'Toole showed himself to be a good moist-ball pitcher in 1912, although his chief fault then, and nearly always has been, lack of control. In 1912 O'Toole won 15 games and lost 17 with the Pirates. Last year he won 6 and lost 8, while this season he has fallen down badly, winning only one game out of ten.

Pittsburgh asked for waivers on O'Toole some weeks ago, and all clubs waived except New York and Cincinnati. McGraw believes that under new conditions and with new catchers to work with O'Toole will regain his old-time form.

O'Toole has never lived up to the promise he showed in the American association. He has never been able to attain control, but Manager McGraw believes that he can overcome this fault, as other pitchers have done. O'Toole will be with the Giants' squad today in Brooklyn.

The Giants have also landed another pitcher in Carl Scull of Scranton, Penn., who has been pitching for the Middletown (N. Y.) club of the Atlantic league. Scull pitched two years ago for the Scranton high school nine and is only 20 years old. He is six feet tall and weighs 170 pounds. He is a right-hander.
