C. F. SCHLABERG DIED YESTERDAY

Father of Frank Schlaberg and Mrs. D. M. Holmes of This City.

C. F. Schlaberg, father of Frank Schlaberg and Mrs. D. M. Holmes in this city, died early Sunday morning at Waverly, Ia., at the home of his son, Warren, according to word received here. Old age was the cause of his death. Mr. Schlaberg being 91 years old.

The deceased was well known in Grand Forks, having lived here for many years. While here he lived at the homes of his daughter and son. For many years past he had lived alternately with his two sons and his daughter, going from one place to the other.

He was here until last September when he returned to Waverly to live. Since last December he was bedridden and was unconscious most of the time. He was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, and came to this country when a young man. His wife is buried at Spring Lake, a short distance from Waverly and he expressed the wish that he be buried there.

Frank Schlaberg of this city was at the bedside of his father when he died and will remain there for the funeral. Mr. Holmes was unable to attend the funeral.

The deceased was a very intelligent man and was always well informed in the big questions of the day. Up to the time of his last sickness he kept close track of everything that was going on. He was alive to all the political questions of the day.

Mr. Schlaberg was half German and half Scotch. His father left Germany and went to Scotland when a young man.

"Saturday," replied the workman, and resumed operations.


