the front and take the personal command of the army.
In Vienna the situation is tense. Food is scarce and famine is threatened. The constantly increasing prices bring food there beyond the reach of the people. It is reported here, is being fortified, and plans are under way to flood the surrounding country against investment.
A dispatch from the front that the Serbian war office admitted today that the forces which crossed the Save to invade Bosnia had been forced to withdraw before a superior force. This is the first time since the war began that Serbia has admitted meeting a reverse.

TWO DISTURBANCES.
Redding, Cal., Sept. 10.—Lassen peak, which had its fortieth eruption yesterday, experienced two violent disturbances today which were pronounced the greatest of the series so far.
Clouds of ashes descended at Mineral, 20 miles from the peak, and a plume-like pillar of smoke was visible for twice that distance.
Several persons reported names emanating from the crater, but the forest bureau's observer near the peak said he saw no fire.

Peace Treaties Signed With U. S.
Great Britain and France Agree—Other Warring Nations Ready.
Washington, Sept. 10.—In the midst of the European war, Great Britain, France, Spain and China have agreed to sign peace commission treaties with the United States. One of the new conventions would be to prevent the United States from being drawn into the present conflict.
Germany, Russia and Japan have signified their acceptance of the principle of these treaties, though negotiations have not advanced to the point of drafting conventions. Similar agreements with Turkey and Greece are almost ready for signature.
