URGES FARMERS TO SELECT SEED

"Seed Corn Week" Has Been Designated for Next Week—Now is Time.

O. D. Center, better farming agent in this county, is making a strong effort to interest the farmers in the proposition of selecting seed corn for the 1915 crop.

The splendid showing should be continued. The 100 bushels of seed corn selected and cured by the farmers of Grand Forks county last season should be more than doubled.

"The time to provide seed for the 1915 planting is now. The best of last week, in all but a few places, has lapsed the ripening rather than worked an injury.

"It is scarcely less than criminal to neglect the selection of seed corn at this time and from our splendid crop. After examining fields in every part of the county we are convinced that the desire to secure seed is about the only thing lacking for the possibility of getting splendid seed corn is at hand on every side.

"Seed corn should be selected from the standing stalk. The selected ears should be raked, strung, or hung where there is a good circulation of air on all sides and where the moisture of the cob and grain may be rapidly evaporated and carried off.

"With our possibilities and advantages let us make the coming week 'Seed Corn Week,' and at the end of the next seven days let us be able to say that Grand Forks county has selected and has in the curing sufficient corn for her entire acreage in 1915.

"If I can help you in any way in this important matter I am at your service."

GETTING READY FOR BIG CONTEST

George B. Clifford of Minneapolis Offers \$500 in Prizes.

Instructions concerning the Clifford corn contest, for which George B. Clifford of Minneapolis has offered \$500 in prizes, are being sent out by Don V. Moore of this city. The contest is confined to the northern half of the state and this section is divided into three districts.

The Districts.

District number one will comprise the counties of Traill, Steele, Griggs, Grand Forks, Nelson, Eddy, Foster, Wells and those portions of Pierce, Benson and Ramsey county lying south of the north line of Grand Forks and Nelson counties.

District number two will comprise the counties of Walsh, Pembina, Cavalier, Towner, Rolette and that portion of Pierce, Benson and Ramsey counties lying north of the north line of Grand Forks and Nelson counties.

District number three will consist of the counties of Bottineau, Renville, McHenry, Mountrail, Burke, Divide, Williams and Ward.

A first prize of \$100, second of \$40 and third of \$25 will be awarded in each one of these districts.

Rules Announced.

Secretary D. V. Moore announces the rules governing the awarding of these prizes as follows:

Any resident farmer who wishes to compete in his district can do so by having any field agent of the Better Farming association or any local banker go to his field of corn and measure off one acre at any place in the field which shall be one continuous acre and not detached portions and may be any shape but must contain 160 square rods.

Judging.

The method of judging is as follows: After determining exact acre, go in and husk 100 ears from a continuous row of rows, taking every ear from every hill until 1,000 ears are gathered.

Weigh carefully and determine average weight per ear, then separate immature from the mature ears and again weigh, in order to arrive at the per cent of mature corn. Then go into selected acre and count every ear of corn and determine the yield of mature corn, according to the figures and percentage obtained from the 1,000 ears and make returns, both in gross yield per acre and yield of mature corn.

All corn that is dented and sufficiently hard to make seed if picked and hung with care, and the yield of mature corn, may be considered mature corn. Ears in soft dough or still in the milk are immature.

Statement of yield must be made on personal honor and must be signed by the representative of the Better Farming association or local banker who judged the acre, and shall also be attested by the contestant.

FRACTURES ARM

Linton, N. D., Sept. 12.—Carroll Leuhe, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Leuhe, who is visiting here with the Leuhert children, had the misfortune to fracture his arm while playing with some other children and the little burro. The boys had the mule hitched to a small wagon and the Leuhe boy was of the burro's back. When someone of them hit the animal it jumped and the boy fell off, fracturing one of the small bones of the fore arm. The fracture was reduced by a local physician and the patient is now doing nicely.
