PIONEER PASTOR DIED SATURDAY

Rev. G. J. Omland of Park River Passes Away at Local Hospital.

Rev. G. J. Omland, aged 71, pioneer resident of Park River, and formerly pastor of the United Lutheran church of that town, died at a Grand Forks hospital of intestinal trouble, late Saturday.
The body was sent to Park River today for burial. Services will be held at the church of which Mr. Omland was pastor for so many years.
The deceased is survived by his widow, and ten children, a number of whom reside in Park River. He had been ill for some time, and came to this city for treatment last week.
Mr. Omland was born in Norway in 1843. He came to America in 1871, studied at Luther college, Decorah, Ia., and Augsburg seminary, Minneapolis, and was ordained a minister in 1877.
He came to Park River in 1886, after having taken an active part in the founding of the United Lutheran church in this country, and was pastor of the church in that town until 1905 when he resigned on account of ill health.
After his retirement Mr. Omland occupied himself with farming up to the time of his death.

RENDER VERDICT
Woman Given \$2,000 as Result of Dismissal by Board on Account of Alleged Incompetency.
Moorhead, Minn., Sept. 14.—In the case of Anna B. Christensen against the school board and superintendent of schools of Hawley, Minn., the plaintiff was awarded a verdict of \$2,000 by the jury. Upon the announcement of the jury, the defendants moved that the verdict be set aside and judgment be pronounced in their favor by the court, which was refused. Thereupon, the defendants made a motion for a new trial, which Judge Nye declared that he would grant, unless the plaintiff reduced her judgment to \$1,200. This she has declined to do.
The case, which has attracted widespread interest in this section, is the result of Miss Christensen's dismissal by the board last January, on a charge of incompetence.
