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WHEAT TUMBLES DURING SESSION

Closed Over Six Cents Lower Today—Slump is Remarkable.

Minneapolis—September wheat closed 6 3/8 lower, December wheat 6 1/2 lower, May wheat 6 3/8 lower.

The wheat market had a slump today with final figures at the low point of the day. Receipts of spring wheat were on a liberal scale and they are expected to be still heavier if the weather continues favorable.

The United States visible supply showed an increase of 1,755,000 bushels for the past week.

Clearances of wheat and flour were very liberal, total equalling 1,449,000 bushels, 1,281 cars of wheat in Duluth today compared with 1,028 a year ago.

Minneapolis received 1,326 cars against 924 a year ago, 208 cars of wheat received at Kansas City today. Liverpool was weak and closed 2d lower.

WHEAT SHIPMENTS. Broomhall cables from Liverpool as follows: Wheat shipments the past week from North America amounted to 3,553,000 bushels, corn 38,000 bushels, oats 1,122,000 bushels.

Distribution of wheat shipments from North America follows: United Kingdom 3,302,000 bushels, Rotterdam 891,000 bushels.

France 1,511,000 bushels, Spain 335,000 bushels, Italy 451,000 bushels, Scandinavia 360,000 bushels.

Germany 413,000 bushels, Non Europe 1,002,000 bushels.
