

TACK REMOVED FROM WINDPIPE

Little Casselton Girl is Recovering from Delicate Operation.

Casselton, N. D., Sept. 28.—Mr. and Mrs. Martin Kittel returned from St. Joseph's hospital, St. Paul, exceedingly happy to bring with them their 6-year-old daughter, Ruth, from whose bronchial tubes had been taken the brass headed tack swallowed some time ago while at play. The noted specialist who handled the very difficult case required three attempts before becoming successful—the first two taking three or four hours and the last only an hour and a half. The earliest attempt demonstrated the necessity of specially designed instruments, and one was constructed to reach down the windpipe—with telescope and electric light—but the tack could not be grasped because of its having become imbedded in the tissues. In the last operation the specialist was enabled to delicately sever

about the parts in which the tack had located and then get hold of it and remove it. After each operation little Ruth had, of course, to recuperate from the effects of anaesthetic and depleted nervous condition. She was exceedingly brave throughout the ordeal. With the care she is receiving she is expected soon to be free from every result of accident and operation.

FRACTURED RIBS

St. Thomas Man Injured in Fall from Loading Platform.

St. Thomas, N. D., Sept. 28.—Jas. Dickie, of Glasston, met with an accident which will lay him up for some time. He was engaged in loading a loading platform in such a way as to sustain severe bruises about his head and also suffered a fracture of two ribs on his left side. His condition is considered serious.

RESIDENCE BURNED

Dundee Farmer Loses Home by the Fire Route.

Grafton, N. D., Sept. 28.—The fine farm residence of N. O. Cletenson in Dundee township was entirely destroyed by fire. The fire gained headway so rapidly after its discovery that nothing in the building could be saved. The loss on the building and contents will be in the neighborhood of \$4,500, while \$1,500 of insurance was carried. Mr. Cletenson will commence the erection of another home immediately.

MEDORA WOMEN KILLED WILDCAT

Followed Animal into Chicken House and Clubbed it to Death.

Medora, N. D., Sept. 28.—Mrs. Reilly, living on the Big Plateau, twenty-five miles south of Medora, noticed an animal disturbing her chickens. Getting a club, she went out to drive the marauder away, but in the chase it ran into the chicken house. Mrs. Reilly followed it, and in order that it should not escape before they had arrived at a complete understanding, she closed the door and beat the animal to death. Not knowing what the animal was, she asked a neighbor to view the remains; he pronounced it a wildcat, or bobcat—and a big one. This little woman, ignorant of the capabilities of the beast, performed what a man in full knowledge would never be hired to undertake—to kill a wildcat with a club in a pit.

CHILDREN DEAD

Two Tots Pass Away in Arnegard Hospital.

Alexander, N. D., Sept. 28.—Two children of Mr. and Mrs. E. Pederson of Charbonneau, a boy aged about four and a girl about 1, died in the Arnegard hospital within an hour of each other.

CASE REOPENED

10 Years Work in Estate Case Must be Done Over.

Carrington, N. D., Sept. 28.—In the hearing in the Edward M. Vining estate in the county court before C. S. Campbell, an order was entered favorable to the contestants. The entire estate matter must now be reopened and all the probate procedure gone over again. The estate has been in probate for ten years and the error that caused the present ruling is of long standing. During the ten years that the estate has been in probate, the land has been sold, mortgaged, etc., by the administrator, David Vining, and the new ruling makes the past transactions illegal. The contest was brought about by a daughter of the deceased who lives at Red Wing, Minn. Her contention was that she had never been notified of any probate proceedings and had no chance to voice her wishes.

London, Sept. 28.—A dispatch to the Reuter Telegram company from Antwerp says that the Germans Sunday recommenced the bombardment of Malines. The people were obliged to quit their reconstructed habitations. Heavy gun fire is also heard in the direction of Hofstade.

BROOMHALL CABLES.

Liverpool—On the Pacific coast the government has overestimated the wheat crop by at least 26,000,000 bushels and the amount available for export to Europe will be short 15,000,000 bushels. Holders are not selling freely and the demand from foreign buyers is urgent. Quality is excellent. Oats show a deficit of fully 25 per cent. North American shipments: Wheat 8,473,000 bushels, corn 425,000 bushels, oats 2,168,000 bushels. Wheat was distributed to foreign countries as follows: United Kingdom 3,784,000 bushels; America 21,200 bushels; Rotterdam 416,000 bushels; France 784,000 bushels; Spain 604,000 bushels; Scandinavia 675,000 bushels; Greece 982,000 bushels; Rio de Janeiro 208,000 bushels; non Europe 898,000 bushels. Of the total wheat Canada shipped 1,980,000 bushels and the Pacific coast 864,000 bushels.

MICHIGAN IN FIRST TRIAL WITH DEPAUW

Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 28.—Yost Saturday completed the last week of preliminary training for his Michigan football men, and today started active preparation for the opening game of the season, which comes Wednesday, when Coach Tom Bogie, former Wolverine, brings his De Pauw university eleven to Perry field. Advice from Greencastle indicate that a veteran squad has been training for this clash, and Coach Yost anticipates a battle which will try the mettle of his men.

It will be merely a tentative eleven which the Michigan leader will send into the game, for Yost will use this clash as a training test for the men whom he expects to later mold into his varsity. Many of his "doubtfuls" will be given a chance to prove their worth, and it is more than likely that a majority of the training squad will get into the game at one time or another during the hour of play.

Get Initial Test.

The scrimmages of the last week have given Yost a fair line on his men, but the actual clash of intercollegiate competition is still needed to test the ability of the Wolverines under fire. With the possible exception of Captain Rayford, Cochran Lyons, there is not a man on the squad trying for places on the line who is yet sure of his post.
