FRANK MAYER IS OUT WITH INJURY

East Grand Forks Boy Hurt in Practice—Hamilton Injured, Too.

BOTH MAY BE IN GAME TOMORROW

Freshmen Give Regulars a Hard Workout in Preparation for Ames.

Minneapolis, Oct. 9.—Frank Mayer, who made such an excellent showing at tackle in the North Dakota game, and Hamilton, one of the backfield men, were injured in yesterday's practice. The Minnesota team was given a stiff work-out in preparation for the Ames game tomorrow, and the two players were injured in the clash with the freshmen. It is expected, however, that both will be in the game tomorrow.

The freshmen last night, after an hour's drill in Ames formations, tore into the varsity with a vigor that elicited cheers from the rooters witnessing the practice. For the first time this season, the work-out crossed the first team's goal line. The freshmen players outplayed the varsity and tackled harder. They scored the only touchdown of the afternoon when Hanson, halfback, grabbed a varsity forward pass and ran 50 yards to the goal line. Tyra also barely missed scoring a drop kick from the 20-yard line for the yearlings.

It was decidedly an off day for the Gophers. They showed little pep and the line work was loose and slow. Bastian at end, Bierman at left half, Captain Rosenthal at center and Solon fullback, were exceptions. It is likely that the cool weather will help in bringing the players back to form to-day. The entire freshmen eleven displayed all sorts of pep, the end, Bigelow and Ballentine, and the backfield men, Hanson, Kieffman, Wyman, Tyra and Brennan all doing well.

SHIFT IN HAMLINE LINEUP NECESSARY

Faculty Declares Two Veterans Ineligible—Flickertails Left This Noon

HAVE DEVELOPED A STRONG ATTACK

Eleven Has Made Rapid Progress Since the Clash With Gopher Outfit.

When the Flickertail eleven meets the Hamline university team tomorrow afternoon they will find the Metropolitan squad slightly crippled because of scholastic difficulties. Coach Baird has had to make a hurried switch in his lineup, but he expects to have the team working in fine form tomorrow.

Hamline's varying football fortunes slumped Wednesday when it became known that the faculty had pronounced Mulder and Oppgaard, veterans, ineligible for the 1914 season. This necessitated an eleventh-hour change by Coach Baird in preparation for tomorrow's game with the North Dakota team. Down was moved from center to Oppgaard's end, and Rolse sent in at center. Quarterback Steele is suffering from blood poisoning. At a meeting of the Hamline team Wednesday night, Larson, a guard, was chosen captain for this season.

The Flickertail team also will be crippled tomorrow. Nilles, who was injured in the Minnesota game, was not taken to St. Paul, and Captain Schlosser's place at left end will have to be filled by Flint. Heimkay will substitute in full for Nilles.

The team left this noon for St. Paul. The following men made the trip: Flint and Muir, ends; Finngerson and Lynch, tackles; Rohwedder and Marmon, guards; Murphy, center; McKay, quarter; Lowe and Murray, halves; Heimkay, fullback; James, Boyce, Clark and Payne are the substitutes.

Yesterday afternoon's practice was one of the best of the season. Since the return from the Minnesota game, the Flickertail team has shown steady improvement until the men have developed an exceptionally good attack and a strong defense. During the week the players have mastered an entirely new set of plays and formations, which will be sprung on the Hamline players tomorrow.

Chicago, Oct. 9.—Baseball gamblers made their usual "cleanup" on the result of the opening game of the city championship yesterday, the betters flocking behind Jim Vaughn and making the opening price 7 to 5 on the Cubs' chances, with the proviso that Big Jim must start. These odds were backed down to 6 to 5 a short time before the game began. South side followers coming to the front with wads of coin to be placed on the Six.

The leading winner of the day was a South side gambler known as Nick the Greek, it being whispered among the "select" that he wagered something like \$13,000 on the Cubs. He had an assistant with him at the South Side park keeping track of his bet, and he was never wagger offered, against the Cubs at 6 to 5.

On the West side, a Cub supporter known as Shim not only made a killing on the Cubs' story when he won over \$5,000, but he also took hand in the Fournier-Saler squabble. He bet a lump sum of \$1,100 that the O'Day Wednesday would outwit the Frencheman in the opening combat and \$1,500 even that Victor would also top the South sider during the series.

At the downtown books the Cubs brought 6 to 5 and 13 to 10 in the morning, the odds increasing as the game progressed, as good as 4 to 1 being offered after the first inning, but the National leaguers would "oop." Plenty of action was reported all along the line.
