JAMES SHIMEK IS CALLED BY DEATH

Resident of the City for the Last Fifteen Years Passes Away.

James Shimek, a resident of East Grand Forks for the past 15 years, died at 7:45 o'clock last evening, at St. Michael's hospital in Grand Forks, typhoid fever and kidney trouble causing his demise after an illness of six weeks.

Funeral services will be held Monday morning at 9 o'clock from the Sacred Heart Catholic church, Father Klinkhammer officiating.

Mr. Shimek came to East Grand Forks from New Prague, Minn., at which point he had resided practically all his life, his parents moving to that point from Bohemia, where he was born.

During his residence in East Grand Forks, Mr. Shimek has resided at 911 Phillipsbury avenue.

Surviving Mr. Shimek are five sons and a daughter—Miss Eva Shimek, residing at home, and Albert, John, Martin, Joseph, James and Frank, all residents of East Grand Forks and Grand Forks.

Four sisters and three brothers, residents of New Prague, Minn., also survive him.

FARMER KILLS FATHER IN LAW, SHOOTS WIFE AND ENDS OWN LIFE

Maxbass, N. D., Oct. 10.—Melvin Booth, aged 30, shot and killed his father-in-law; probably fatally injured his wife, and ended his own life.

Booth is supposed to have been insane, and the murder and suicide grows out of a family quarrel which had its inception last night.

The double tragedy occurred on the Booth farm six miles northwest of Maxbass.

Mrs. Booth is in a Westhope hospital, with a bullet wound in her wrist, another in her arm, and another in her jaw.

The father-in-law was instantly killed by a bullet which entered the back of his neck.

The murderer killed himself by bracing the gun between his legs and firing into his throat, the big charge tearing his head in a horrible manner.

Last night Mrs. Booth, after a quarrel with her husband, went to the home of a neighbor. She returned this morning. The father-in-law, who had been living with his daughter, decided to leave the place this morning because of Booth's attitude, and he had packed his suit case and was rounding a corner of the house, on his way of the farm, when Booth shot him down in cold blood. The tragedy was discovered an hour later by Robert Stark, another farmer.

INDIANS MAKING GOOD AS FARMERS

Fair at Ft. Totten Indicates That Splendid Results are Being Achieved.

Devils Lake, N. D., Oct. 10.—That the Indians of the Devils Lake reservation are making progress along agricultural lines, is thoroughly reflect-

ed by the displays made at the Indian fair which closed at Fort Totten this week, following the most satisfactory exhibition of the kind ever held there. Superintendent C. M. Ziebach, who fathered the fair movement, and Secretary Camp, who is responsible for no small share of the success of the undertaking, are optimistic over the outlook for future fairs.

A great sham battle, in which the Indians, bedecked with feathers and decorated with paint, participated with a zeal that indicated they have not entirely forgotten the frontier days in the northwest, colored the fair with a blaze of glory.

While the weather was far from pleasant yesterday, there was a good sized crowd of interested spectators from various points, in attendance. A large number of Devils Lake people took occasion during the week to motor over to the fort and the advancement that is being made in the fair was freely commented upon. Very
