

HARVEST HANDS LOSE THEIR ROLL

Quartet of Colored Men take Money From Whites Near Larimore.

Three harvest hands—Andy Anderson, John Nelf and Orin Morgan—were minus \$100 as a result of an attack by three negroes. The farm laborers were in Grand Forks yesterday and made complaint to the local police. They gave a description of the three men who held them up, but said description was lacking in detail. In fact, practically all they could tell was that the robbers were black and each carried a gun.

The robbery occurred near Larimore Saturday night. The men were hoping it along the Great Northern railroad tracks to the lights of Larimore when a trio of negroes loomed up out of the ditch and leveled guns at them. The harvest hands were forced to shell over. They hurried to Larimore and summoned assistance, but could find no trace of the men. Believing that the negroes were headed for Grand Forks, they came to this city yesterday morning and complained to the local police.

ELECTRICIAN HURT

Encounters Live Wire While Repairing Line at Farm. Fargo, N. D., Oct. 12.—Harry Wade, who is an electrician employed by the Union Light, Heat, Power, company, had his arm quite badly burned on the farm owned by Chesbro Smith. At first it was thought necessary to amputate the arm, but an effort was made to save it and last reports show its condition better than was expected.

Wade was assigned to take care of some trouble on the Smith farm yesterday and was on a pole when the accident happened. In some manner he got his arm across the points of contact of two 2,300 volt wires and received the entire charge in his arm. He managed to reach the ground and signaled to Chesbro Smith, who was standing near and who had no intimation of any trouble. Mr. Smith, thinking that Wade wanted some information, walked over and at once noticed the arm, and taking Wade in his car, brought him to Dr. Burton, who dressed the wounds.

The arm was badly burned from the elbow down, in some places to a regular crisp, and it will be some time before he can resume his work.

TAFT-BOWERS WEDDING OCT. 17 SEASON'S BIG EVENT AT CAPITAL

Washington, Oct. 12.—Social Washington is more interested just now in the two weddings in the Bowers family than in any other event of the fall season. In this marriage on October 17 of Miss Bowers, daughter of the late Solicitor General Lloyd Bowers, and Robert Taft, son of former President and Mrs. Taft, the capital will witness a wedding second only in interest to the recent White House weddings.

It will bring back to Washington for the time being not only the entire Taft family but a large number of the social and official notables of the Taft regime, including former Secretary of the Treasury and Mrs. Franklin MacVeagh of Chicago. Former Secretary of Agriculture and Miss Wilson are living here, and it is expected that some representatives of the Meyer family will come down for the event.

Miss Taft is to be the maid of honor. Miss Bowers' other attendants are to be Miss Louise Hellen, who two weeks later will marry Tom Bowers, the bride's brother; Miss Frances Noyes of Washington and Chicago, Miss Julia Thompson of Chicago, and Miss Marjorie Edgar of Minneapolis.

Naturally the young people are not proclaiming the itinerary of their wedding journey, but they have promised to return for the wedding of Tom Bowers and Louise Hellen on October 31. That also is to be a noon wedding at "Old St. John's," and the bride and bridegroom of the first wedding will be matron of honor and best man at the second. Miss Hellen is to have both a matron of honor and a maid of honor, her sister, Miss Helen, serving in the latter capacity. She will be further attended by Miss Frances Noyes, Miss Eleanor Keyburn, and Miss Julia Whiting as bridesmaids.

FIRE AT STREETER

About 10,000 Acres of Hayland Acre Burned Over. Streeter, N. D., Oct. 12.—About 10,000 acres of hay land and stubble was burned over northwest of this city by a prairie fire which started at the N. P. right of way. Several farm residences were destroyed, and the total losses by the fire are estimated at \$30,000. Several farmers narrowly escaped being burned to death while fighting the advancing fire.

NARROW ESCAPE

Farmer Rendered Unconscious in Path of Advancing Fire. Lisbon, N. D., Oct. 12.—Jacob Ruggling, a farmer, was thrown from a gang plow and rendered unconscious while playing a fire break ahead of a rapidly spreading fire, recovered his consciousness with the fire only a few feet away. Three of the five horses attached to the plow, which had become mired by a big rock, were burned to death, while the other two were badly scorched before the owner could free them. He himself escaped with minor burns.

HURT AT DENHOFF

Northern Pacific Agent Injured While Loading Trunk. Denhoff, N. D., Oct. 12.—M. L. Parker, local agent for the Northern Pacific, was the victim of a painful accident. While loading some heavy trunks into the baggage car, a trunk slipped back and struck Mr. Parker in the back, making a painful injury. Mr. Parker left for Brainerd, Minn., to take treatment at the hospital there.

BIG FAIR AT OAKES

Fargo, N. D., Oct. 12.—Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week will be busy days for Oakes. On Thursday the fifth annual corn show will open, continuing until Saturday evening. To the corn and vegetable exhibits this year has been added live stock. The program has been out for several weeks and should be in the hands of all by this time.

INJURED ON ENGINE

Binford, N. D., Oct. 12.—Rayburn Bennett, a young man who has been employed by Anton Larson this fall, sustained a bad cut on his head while he was doing some work around a threshing engine. In attempting to place the drive belt on the fly wheel the belt slipped, causing him to lose his balance and in falling he struck his head on the clutch, inflicting a wound three inches long and clear to the bone and severing an artery.

KILLED BABY.

Accidental Death of Child Caused by Father in Auto. Fairdale, Oct. 12.—Joe Inger accidentally killed his baby daughter at his farm near here. While running his automobile out of the garage, one of the car wheels threw the baby to the concrete floor, her skull being crushed. The father didn't notice the accident till he had backed his car clear out. His first warning being when her already lifeless body appeared from under his car as he went out of the door.
