Valley City Man Has Refused Offer of \$6,000 For 346 Year old Bible.

Valley City, N. D., Nov. 10.—Now that old relics and keepsakes are being treasured more than ever and newspapers devote liberal space to reports of the ravages of time, the book is the property of C. C. Curtis, an instructor in the commercial department of the state normal school here, and has been in his family for seventeen generations. It is the oldest English bible in America and is a fine specimen of the work of the printing press of the 17th century.

PRairie FIRES ARE STILL RAGING

More Losses Sustained Near Williston, Berthold and Benedict.

Williston, N. D., Nov. 10.—Fifty thousand dollars is the estimated fire damage done in Williams county in the last few days by a series of prairie fires, which have resulted in repeated excursions of fire fighters from this city to aid the farmers in combating the flames.

U. L. Burdick, former lieutenant governor of North Dakota, and defeated gubernatorial candidate this year, has been one of the most active fire fighters, leading a big party of business men who fought several hours against a fire just west of the city. In that fire, a strip two miles wide and 15 miles long was burned over.

Burdick also had a heavy fire loss on his ranch, 20 miles southwest of here, where the prairie fire swept across it, destroying several buildings and property.

The Dedrick farm, north of here, was the scene of one fire, which was stopped before it got beyond the bounds of that place.

Exceptionally dry weather this fall, coupled with a luxuriant growth of grass during the past season, is responsible for an unusually large number of prairie fires.

Berthold, N. D., Nov. 10.—A prairie fire southwest of here burned over about 10,000 acres, entailing heavy losses aggregating about \$25,000. Cecil Birch and Andrew Halberg were the heaviest losers, their entire crop being destroyed, just as they were about to begin threshing.

Benedict, N. D., Nov. 10.—The worst fire this part of the county has had since it was settled was started four miles west of town by a Russian firing a straw stack. The wind was blowing quite hard and it carried the fire along at a rapid rate.

A great amount of damage was done and the loss sustained by those in the path of the fire. The buildings on the east quarter of the land owned by John Skon, on the E. K. Johnson farm, except the residence, with all of his hay, grain and some chickens were burned. Others who suffered losses by the fire were: E. V. Larson, two stacks of hay; N. A. Latimer, hay; Munns and Arnold, hay, about 75 tons; E. M. Lillhaugen, 11 stacks of hay, about 100 tons and Geo. Aas, about 20 tons of hay on the Cartwright farm, southeast of town.

For a while it looked as if the entire village would be wiped off the map and it was only through hard work that it was avoided. The fire burned into the limits of the village and cleared the grass in the yard of J. A. Morris.

State Board Adopts Practical Method of Advertising Dakota's Opportunities.

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 10.—Actual information on the subject of what North Dakota farming properties will cost the prospective new resident in the state has been compiled by the state board of immigration, and is being circulated in the eastern and central east communities, in the hope of inducing new immigration to the state.

This pamphlet is unique from others, in that it deals with actual questions of cost. The book contains a large number of state farms that are for sale, giving a detailed description of the land, the buildings, etc., and the list price.

Heretofore, publicity matter used by the department has been in the nature of "boasting" material, and little attention has been given to the fundamental question—what does it cost?
