

HAD TO SEND FOR ELECTION RETURNS

Sheridan County Canvassors Didn't Get Far Before They Needed Aid.

Plentywood, Mont., Nov. 12.—The county canvassing board had only examined the returns from the first precinct after they went into session Monday when they found it necessary to bring in the election board from that precinct to determine which way the vote has been cast on the county seat question. Polling place No. 1 is Wealthy precinct east 48 ballots, and from that precinct one of the tally books show the vote was 4 to 5 in favor of Plentywood while the other tally book showed that the vote was 41 to 5 in favor of Medicine Lake. On advice of County Attorney Labcock the sheriff sent forthwith to Wealthy and brought the election officers before the canvassing board, after which the majority vote was counted for Plentywood. Owing to an inadvertence the clerks had simply a witches' columns in marking the faulty tally book.

G. A. R. AT MINOT

Veterans Select That City for Next Annual Encampment.

Minot, N. D., Nov. 12.—The executive board of the North Dakota G. A. R. and U. S. C. has decided to hold the next annual encampment in Minot, this city being accepted, according to notice just received from the organization. Inasmuch as this probably will be the last time that Minot will have the honor of entertaining the veterans, the officers propose elaborate features for their guests. The Minot Association of Commerce conventions committee will be in charge of the plans.

N. P. GIVES CUP

Offer Trophy to Farmers' Club in Valley City Show.

Valley City, N. D., Nov. 12.—The Northern Pacific railroad has given a valuable silver cup as the trophy for which farmers' clubs of Barnes county will compete at the annual corn and alfalfa show here this month. The club having the best display of grain will get the trophy. It is expected that about ten clubs will compete for the cup, and from the several choice displays that will be on hand, it is proposed to make a Barnes county display, the same to be used for advertising purposes.

DROP SCHOOL CASE

Action at Portal Dismissed by Judge

Portal, N. D., Nov. 12.—District Judge Leighton at Minot dismissed an action brought against the school board here by a farmer in a township, who alleged that the school building was being used for other purposes than those for which it was erected, and that certain school funds had been improperly used and that the rural schools were being neglected. The farmer decided to appropriate some township money to prosecute the case against the board but a counter injunction was served on them on the ground that the township is not the province of a township to appropriate such a sum in such a manner. The case was argued before Judge Leighton at Howells Saturday, and the prosecution failing to present any substantial evidence, the case was promptly dismissed.

LAD MADE GOOD

Wins Eddy Prize and Takes Extra Donation for Success.

New Rockford, N. D., Nov. 12.—John Noack, aged 10, the winner of the Eddy county corn contest, growing the best corn in Valley City township, not only pulls down a big prize offered by the corn show, but he also pulls down a \$10 additional prize, given by the corn show, and a \$100 prize, given by the county. Last spring when John Noack got into the corn industry, he impressed on his uncle, George C. O'Keefe, the advantages of the big contest. Mr. O'Keefe, who had a lot of land with seed for a half acre, and as an additional incentive, told the boy he would get an extra \$100 piece of land carried away the county honors. John made good in the contest, his corn scoring high and shoulders over the corn of the competitors.

PIONEERS ON THE JOB

They Will Meet at Valley City Tomorrow in Annual Session.

Valley City, N. D., Nov. 12.—Over a hundred pioneer settlers of Barnes county will gather in Valley City tomorrow for the annual meeting of the Barnes County Pioneer club. An interesting feature of the day's program will be an exhibition of Indian war dancing by Indians who have been brought here by John Marsh, an old time Indian fighter, now residing with the Northern Sheyenne Indians, formerly supreme in their control of this region. A big banquet will be held in the evening.

BUILD RAIL SPUR

Plentywood, Mont., Nov. 12.—A railroad spur, 2,000 feet long has been built into the Plentywood coal fields, and a large crew of men will be employed all winter mining coal to be shipped to the town and farmers throughout the Plentywood portion of the county along the Soo line branch.



WORK HARDSHIP ON RETURNING

Americans in Canada Selling Out Meet Difficulty in Livestock Order.

Portal, N. D., Nov. 12.—Canadian officials here are in receipt of instructions from their government placing an embargo on cattle, hogs, horses, sheep, dogs, poultry, etc., from the United States on account of the outbreak of the foot and mouth disease in that country. An embargo has also been ordered indefinitely by the United States government on all animals, hay, straw, meats and hides from Canada. Canadian cattle and hogs destined for Chicago and St. Paul have been passing here at the rate of 40 to 50 cars a day for ten days and since the embargo went into force several shipments have been refused. Americans in Canada who were expecting to return to the United States this fall will no doubt be forced to sell their live stock at a sacrifice or remain there until the order is recalled.

COSTLY FIRE ON A FARM.

All the Buildings, an Auto and 16 Head of Stock Burned.

Enderlin, N. D., Nov. 12.—The fire in the O. Goldberg farm adjoining the city, which was destroyed by fire yesterday. The buildings were occupied by Marcus Maley and his family. Ten horses, six cows, a large quantity of hay and grain, harness and an auto belonging to Mr. Maley were destroyed; also all the household effects. The origin of the fire is not known. The buildings were partially insured.

BIG POULTRY SHOW.

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 12.—Plans are already under way for the staging of the annual show of the North Dakota State Poultry association, which will be held in Fargo during the grain growers' convention, Jan. 19-22, 1915.

The two men were brought over to Fargo. Angel has already served time in the county jail, it is reported. A resident of the hollow declares that he saw them Tuesday night with the harness.

LIVESTOCK RULES IN NORTH DAKOTA

Welsh Says Shipments with in the State are Not Affected by Orders.

Minot, N. D., Nov. 12.—Dr. E. J. Welsh of Minot, president of the state live stock sanitary board, announced that owing to the discovery of foot and mouth disease in the state that there has been an embargo placed on shipments of cattle, sheep and swine out of the state unless intended for immediate shipment, by order of the state veterinarian, W. F. Crewe, Bismarck. Dr. Welsh received a telegram from the state official telling of the embargo. This action, while it will prevent shipments to points outside of the state, will not prevent shipments inside, according to Dr. Welsh. Shipments of cattle and other stock will be received from states which have not already been quarantined by the disease.

RAID GAMBLING DEN

Bismarck Police Find Two Tables in Full Blast.

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 12.—A gambling den was raided in the heart of the residential district, and the most productive haul in the history of the city was made by the police. Fifteen gamblers were arrested and a large quantity of equipment were procured. The men were holding forth in a small carpenter shop back of the Baptist church and within half a block of the governor's mansion. The raiding party was made up of the police knocked and were admitted, and the men finished their game and cashed in while the police looked on. A. Carley and Red Harris, the two proprietors, were bound over to district court today and the rest of them fined.

THEY GET CASH

Women of Edinburg Raise Potatoes

Edinburg, N. D., Nov. 12.—Three hundred bushels of potatoes, harvested by the women of the Edinburg Women's Civic League, will keep that organization supplied with funds for its work during the coming year. The ladies, casting about for means of raising money for the club expenses, hit on the potato raising scheme. They planted an acre of tubers, and their harvest was 310 bushels, which they have sold at prices ranging from 25 to 35 cents a bushel. All told, they will realize about \$60 to \$65 for their season's work, which is sufficient to pay the club expenses during the year.

MAN NEARLY KILLED.

Mandan, N. D., Nov. 12.—Sheriff Samuels of McLean county narrowly escaped being killed and other members of his automobile party seriously injured in an automobile smash-up. The party was coming across the north line track at the east end of the city, when the car, a big Cadillac, skidded and rolled over into the ditch. The windshield was smashed and the steering gear was broken and the car otherwise damaged.

AGED OFFICER QUILTS.

Plentywood, Mont., Nov. 12.—Eli Hanson, the aged county commissioner who has become so ill that his life is now despaired of, has resigned as a member of the board, and District Judge Utter has appointed P. J. Eis, a banker at Medicine Lake, to fill the vacancy.

Williston, N. D., Nov. 12.—C. W. Jennison left Monday to attend to business matters in the twin cities.

NEW COUNTY IS STILL IN WIND

Montana May Have Another Because of Sheridan Movement.

Plentywood, Mont., Nov. 12.—The fact that the county commissioners of Sheridan county recently denied the petition for the creation of Shaw county, which would contain a large portion of the south end of Sheridan county, does not seem to discourage the people in that end of the county, as arrangements are still being put forth to create the county, and the matter will soon be brought before the courts. Meetings have been held at Froid in the northeast corner of proposed Shaw county to discuss the idea of changing the boundary lines of the new county, and it has been given out that Froid will contend with Culbertson for the designation of the county seat as soon as the new county is created, and the contest threatens to be a warmer one than has just been finished between Plentywood and Medicine Lake. Another feature of the fight is the fact that what Medicine Lake lost in its efforts to be designated as the permanent county seat of Sheridan county the business men of that town are endeavoring to have Medicine Lake included in the new county, even though that town strenuously resisted the creation of Shaw county when the matter was before the Sheridan county commissioners.

"TWO THOUSAND"

That is Sunday School Motto for Next Annual Meeting.

Minot, N. D., Nov. 12.—"Two thousand" is the motto that has been adopted by the North Dakota Sunday School association for its next annual convention, which will be held in Minot. Rev. Walter A. Farrow, general secretary of the association, has been spending several days in Minot, and it was in conference with local Sunday school workers that the attendance slogan was adopted. Two years ago the association adopted a 1,500 slogan at Grand Forks, and made good. This year the same slogan was adopted for the annual meeting, and again the attendance was up to expectations. By boosting their slogan 500 points, the association officials believe they will again be able to make good with the largest gathering yet held.
