"Brave and Daring Man" Was Commander Of the Emden, Says British Officer, Once in Custody

Newark, N. J., Nov. 12.—"A brave and daring man" was the commander of the cruiser Emden, terror of the Pacific, according to Robert Glegg, captain of the British transport steamer Lovat, one of the vessels sunk by the German warship which now has been put out of action. The views of Captain Glegg are set forth in a letter written to his friend, William H. Tweedell of South Orange. "What can we think?" wrote the British captain, "of a daring man capturing and sinking ships at sea? He was a brave man. When we left them they were only 72 miles from Calcutta, and it was his intention to go up and sink the pilot cutter, but he was held back by that ironical job, I wish he had carried it out, as it would have awakened the authorities. Captain Glegg, whose ship was engaged for two years in carrying coolies from China to Calcutta, was on his way from Calcutta to embark Indian troops when he was stopped by the Emden and his steamer sent to the bottom within forty minutes after being boarded. The crew of the Lovat was put aboard the Hamburg-American liner Markomannia, which had accompanied the Emden from Taing-Tau as a collier.

"It was not war," the captain writes. "It was ruthless destruction, but of course they were quite within their rights in sinking a transport. "We were three days on board the Markomannia, where we received every courtesy and kindness we could ask for, during which time we saw the more steamers sunk. "On the night of the 12th the Killin of Glasgow and the Kabinga were captured and on the 13th the Killin, coal laden, was sunk and her crew put on board the Kabinga, which had the captain's wife on board, and so was spared. At noon on Sunday the Harrison liner Diplomat was sunk before us, thus ensuring a Sabbath of destruction, and right pitiful it was, I assure you. "I never wish to hear a gun fired again as long as I live, for the sound will ring in my ears until my dying day. "On Monday the 14th we were put on board the Kabinga for conveyance to the British steamer, the Traboch of Liverpool, was sighted and her crew put on board with us and their ship sunk, so we mustered 417 in all, apart from the Kabinga's own crew, sent back to Calcutta. "We received every courtesy and kindness from the Germans while in their hands."

AMERICAN WOMAN SOUGHT TO KILL

Havre, France, Nov. 12.—Mrs. Setelle, an American woman residing in Paris and who was a passenger on the steamship Chicago from New York, was arrested here today on the charge preferred by the police, of attempted murder. After a quarrel with several passengers who teased her dog and became furious at the alleged mistreatment of her pet, Mrs. Setelle is accused of firing twice from an automatic pistol on a man whom she believed to be the ringleader of the mob. Both but she few words and the woman was immediately disarmed. In court Mrs. Setelle said: "I fired in the air merely to frighten the mob."

PROTEST BRITISH ACTION IN COPPER

Washington, Nov. 12.—Senator Hughes of New Jersey laid before the state department today a protest from several big copper companies of his state against the attitude of Great Britain on the shipments of copper to neutral countries.

The petition sets forth that Great Britain has no right to interfere with cargoes plying between neutral countries and states that restrictions such as Great Britain has placed on commerce will seriously threaten the copper industry of the United States.

Great Britain is insisting that copper cables be sent to a specific consignee in neutral countries, otherwise it will be suspected of having an ultimate destination in a belligerent country. The state department has entered as yet into no agreement on the subject, simply presenting the claims and protests of American shippers in the hope of facilitating trade.




