

MINOR CHANGES IN LOCAL CARD

Hannah Train to Arrive in Grand Forks Little Later Than at Present.

LAKOTA TRAIN TO CONNECT WITH 10

Trains Nos. 5 and 6 Changed to Nos. 9 and 10—Other Switches.

When the Great Northern's new time card goes into effect Sunday, there will be but one or minor changes in the schedule for local trains.

One change is in the numbers of trains, No. 9 and 10, St. Paul to Grand Forks by way of Fargo.

The Lakota train, running from Farles, will be held at the former place to make connections with No. 10 from the west.

No. 9 and 10, which furnish part of the twin city service, will run on the schedule of Nos. 5 and 6.

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from the Fergus division, which will run daily except Sunday, and connecting with train No. 111 for Grand Forks; arrive Minot 1:15 a. m.; arrive Havre 1:30 p. m.; connecting with train No. 235 for Butte; arrive Cut Bank 5:50 p. m., connecting with No. 43 and picking up the standard sleeper from Kansas City; leave Spokane 8:15 p. m. This train will carry the standard sleeper for Butte formerly handled by No. 3. The Portland tourist car will be discontinued for the winter.

Train No. 2. Train No. 2 will leave Seattle at 7:30 p. m.; arrive Spokane 7:45 a. m.; leave 8 a. m., thence on present schedule and route to St. Paul.

Train No. 3. Train No. 3 will leave St. Paul at 10:45, taking the place of train No. 29; run via Osseo, St. Cloud, Fargo and Grand Forks; arrive at Grand Forks 8:25 a. m., connecting with No. 35 from Duluth; arrive Minot 3 p. m., make all stops west of Minot; arrive at Havre 6:45 a. m., connecting with No. 233 for Great Falls, thence No. 107 to Butte; arrive Spokane 6 a. m.; leave 8:35 a. m., immediately behind No. 1; arrive Seattle 10:45 p. m. This train will carry standard sleeper from Kansas City to Havre, en route to Great Falls.

Train No. 4. Train No. 4 will leave Seattle at 10:30 a. m.; arrive Spokane at 9:30 p. m., stopping only at Everett, Monmouth, Leavenworth, Wenatchee, Wilson Creek and Harrington, leave Spokane 10:15 p. m., after arrival of the S. P. & S. train from Portland; make all stops between Spokane and Minot; arrive Havre 8:30 p. m., connecting with No. 224 from the Butte division; leave Minot at 1:35 p. m., stopping at branch line junctions; leave Devils Lake 8:20 p. m.; arrive Grand Forks 9:25 p. m.; leave 10 p. m.; Fargo 12:35 a. m.; arrive St. Paul 8 a. m., making the same stops as No. 30 and replacing that train east of Devils Lake. This train will carry standard sleepers, Seattle to St. Paul, Havre (from Great Falls) to Williston, Grand Forks to St. Paul, Fargo to St. Paul; also tourist sleeping car from Spokane to St. Paul.

Local Trains. Local train No. 123 will leave Barnesville daily at 5:30 a. m., with the standard sleeper of No. 3, make all stops en route and arrive at Crookston 8:30 a. m., connecting with trains 34, 133 and 135. The Crookston sleeper will return on No. 8.

No. 111 will leave Fargo 7:05 p. m. after the arrival of No. 1, make all stops en route; arrive Grand Forks at 8:40 p. m. Local service now performed by trains 5 and 6 between Melrose and Barnesville and between Crookston and Grand Forks will be discontinued. Branch line service in North Dakota will be changed in some cases to connect with Nos. 3 and 4.

BABY'S IDENTITY STILL A MYSTERY

No Trace of Parents of the Foundling Discovered by Authorities.

MARKS REMOVED FROM WRAPPINGS

Child Appears None the Worse for Period of Exposure Last Night.

Efforts today on the part of the police to find some clue to the identity of the week old baby, found Monday night on the steps of the residence of J. Nelson Kelly, 521 South Fifth street, proved fruitless.

The youngster is at the home of Mrs. H. Sandbeck, North Third street, today, and appears none the worse for its period of exposure.

Mrs. Pearl Blough, police matron, says that in her opinion the baby had been lying on the steps only a few moments when it was found by Jay Batten. Its feet were perfectly warm when found, and its hands only slightly cold.

The child wore a "Reuben" shirt, and was wrapped in outing flannel, covered with piece of old blanket. There were no marks on any of the clothing. A piece of the blanket, on which there had apparently been a mark of some kind, had been off.

The discovery of the abandoned child took place shortly after 10 o'clock Monday night. Jay Batten, son of Rev. J. H. Batten, was on his way home, and as he passed the Kelly residence heard a faint cry from the front steps.

On investigating he found the baby. He immediately called Mr. Kelly, who notified the police. In the meantime young Batten had taken the child to his own home. Sergeant Hager and Mrs. Pearl Blough were on the scene in a few moments, and at once took charge of the baby.

A search of the birth reports at the city auditor's office today failed to yield any clue to the identity of the parents, and the efforts of the police in the matter have so far proved equally fruitless.

Million and a Half Idle Acres of state School Land May be Used by Belgians

A million and a half acres of idle land in western North Dakota, owned by the state educational institutions, can be used for the benefit of the great avalanche of immigrants to the United States, certain to follow the European war, in the opinion of Governor L. B. Hanna, and he probably will suggest to the state legislature a plan by which such lands can be leased to actual farmers for farming purposes.

At the present time this vast acreage of land produces nothing but hay, and the state's revenue therefrom is inconsequential as compared with the actual value of the great holdings.

Governor Hanna has not made a thorough study of the situation yet, but he is already convinced of its feasibility and will attempt to work out a plan between now and the time the assembly convenes in January, by which he expects the object can be accomplished.

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


