THIRTEEN ENTERED IN FREE-FOR-ALL

Students signify their intentions of Debating This Plan.

Thirteen students have already signified their intentions of participating in the big free-for-all debate at the state university this year. The question for discussion is "Resolved, that the United States should own and operate telephone and telegraph lines."

A meeting of the debating board of control is scheduled to be held at the law school at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon. The final arrangements for the free-for-all and inter-society contests will be made at that time. The free-for-all is to be held the first of December and the other debates will take place the second week. The exact dates will be set this afternoon.

The meeting this afternoon each society will be represented by one delegate. Every society must come up to certain requirements before being allowed representation on the board. The main requirement is that each society shall be organized and carry on regular work. At least one debate must be held each month within the society.

GERMAN PROFESSOR COMING

Prof. Tauschnemann of University of Breslau to be at U. N. D. Next Tuesday to Speak.

Prof. Tauschnemann, a member of the faculty at the University of Breslau, Germany, will speak at the University of North Dakota next Tuesday. Announcement was made to this effect at the institution this afternoon. The exact hour for the address has not been set yet.

Prof. Tauschnemann is an exchange professor to this country from the German institution. He has been traveling about the country speaking in favor of representation on the board. He will appear at Fargo next Sunday. An effort was made to have him speak at the university convocation next Saturday morning, but he will be unable to come until Tuesday.

The speaker has some very interesting things to say about the war and will undoubtedly draw a large crowd.
