

BOYS VICTORIOUS IN CORN CONTEST

Stutsman County Lads give Their Fathers "Aces and Spades," Yet Win.

Jamestown, N. D., Nov. 25.—Stutsman county boys are champions at corn and potato growing, as was evidenced at the annual competition held in this city, when both the boys and their fathers made exhibits of products grown during the year.

The samples shown by the boys were prize winners in the several districts of the county, and they were exceptionally fine. The two prize winners of the boys, in potatoes and corn, took the county sweetstakes as well, outdistancing their fathers.

Charles E. Mehring of Edmunds is the champion corn grower of the county, while Matthew Verlinde of Pingree is the champion potato raiser. Both lads win trips to the state farmers' boy institute at Fargo in December.

In the corn competition H. Hobenthaus of Jamestown took second, Garfield Fredericksen of Kensal took third. There were 57 entries.

In the potato contest Benny Brem of Kensal took second, and Joseph Gubson of Jamestown took third. There were 71 entries.

Mary Chris of Bloom won first prize in the sewing contest. Maude Haskins of Bloom was second and Mabel Johnson of Rose was third.

The baking contest was won by Irene Hunter of Spiritwood. Mary Kuppars of Corwin was second, and Evelyn Hunter of Spiritwood was third.

Bottineau Shows Gains.
Bottineau, N. D., Nov. 25.—Sixty exhibits of corn raised in Bottineau county were displayed at the first corn show held in this city. The show brought out the fact that Bottineau has become a part of the corn belt, whereas less than three years ago, hardly any corn was grown here.

The Brander brothers, William and Erwin, were among the most successful prize winners. They have grown corn in Bottineau county several years long in advance of other farmers. They were engaged in the corn business when others scoffed at the idea, thinking Bottineau was too far north.

CHIROPRACTORS MET
Will Ask for Appointment of State Board of Examiners.
Valley City, N. D., Nov. 25.—North Dakota chiropractors' association was in session at Valley City. Matters of statewide importance were taken up and discussed. The consensus of opinion of those present was to the effect that an effort should be made at the coming session of the legislature to get recognition so that a board of chiropractic examiners may be appointed.

CHURCH DEDICATED
Impressive Services Held at Addition by Bishop Mueller.
Casleton, N. D., Nov. 25.—Impressive services marked the dedication of the new Second Caanan Moravian church at Addition, south of Casleton. The dedication proper took place at

the morning service. Bishop Carl A. Mueller of Watertown, Wis., presiding. Rev. W. S. Ulrich of Fargo preached the sermon in English, and the evening service was in English, the rest being given in German. Bishop Mueller and Rev. W. C. Schattschneider gave addresses at the evening service.

To Rev. W. T. Goerner, pastor of the church, backed by the loyal congregation, is due much of the credit for the new building. It is a handsome structure of red brick faced with white stone. The interior is simply decorated and furnished; the structure is modern throughout. The basement is finished off for parish and social rooms. The latter were initiated with a big dinner served by the ladies of the congregation.

Mandan, N. D., Nov. 25.—Mandan promises to come in for some valuable advertising at the Pan-American exposition which will be held in San Francisco next year, if the energy brought to bear by T. S. Graham, president of the Merchants National bank, bears fruit.

At present Mr. Graham is directing every effort towards inviting the good will of the Universal Film company and exposition officials with a view of showing the pictures taken of the Missouri Slope and Agricultural Fair association and Morton county fair in Mandan last September 30, October 1 and 2, in the North Dakota building during the life of the big attraction on the coast.

LID ON DANCES
Reform Spasm Attacks Council of Dilworth, Minn.
Dilworth, Minn., Nov. 25.—The village council of Dilworth has passed an ordinance prohibiting the holding of public dances on Saturday night. The measure also prohibits the dancing of the grizzly bear, bunny hug, chicken flip, turkey trot and moonlight dances, providing a fine of not more than \$10 as the penalty for violating the ordinance.

COP REWARDED
Fargo Officer Receives \$25 From Bottineau County.
Fargo, N. D., Nov. 25.—Special Officer Charley Anderson of the local force has received a warrant for \$25 from the commissioners of Bottineau county. The money is a reward for Anderson's services in the Milo-Miller murder case a few weeks ago. The two suspects were arrested in Moorhead and Fargo. After the arrest, Anderson searched the men's room in a lower front street hotel, finding there bloody clothes belonging to Milo and Miller, which furnished the principal evidence against the suspects, both of whom were later convicted.

In the letter which accompanied the warrant, Sheriff Sandstrom of Bottineau county said that the commissioners decided, in view of the fact that Anderson was entitled to a "box of bonbons." The bonbons proved to be the \$25 warrant mentioned above.

E. P. TOTTEN MUST DEFEND OFFICE

Charged with Bribery Caused he Promised to take County Job at low Salary.

Bowman, N. D., Nov. 25.—E. P. Totten, successful candidate for county judge of Bowman county, is charged with bribery in a contest brought by his defeated opponent, F. E. Diehl. Diehl alleges that Totten's announcement previous to the campaign that he would perform the duties of county judge at \$1,500 annually, instead of taking the full salary allowed for the position, constitutes bribery.

Totten defeated Diehl by a margin of 144 votes. The contention of Diehl has created somewhat of a sensation in this district. The case will be tried in district court immediately.

FARMERS' PHONE CO.
Is Organized at Meeting Held in Church at Mott.
Mott, N. D., Nov. 25.—A meeting of the farmers north of Mott was held for the purpose of organizing a Farmers' Co-operative Telephone company. F. L. Shuman, general manager of the North Dakota Independent Telephone company, and R. E. Trousdale, president of the Mott Commercial club, were in attendance at the meeting.

At present Mr. Shuman put up the proposition of purchasing the line running north from Mott to the Stark county line. This is the old Richardson line and at the present time is not being used by the telephone company; in fact they have already sold the line south from Richardson to the Stark county line.

NEW POSTMASTER
Newspaper Man Appointed to Position at Regent, N. D.
Mott, N. D., Nov. 25.—F. E. Ellickson, editor and proprietor of the Regent Times, was appointed postmaster at Regent. As soon as the necessary arrangements can be made he will take over the office.

BUILDINGS GROWING
Standard Oil Company Completing Imposing Group at Minot.
Minot, N. D., Nov. 25.—The Standard Oil group of buildings is rapidly nearing completion and the various structures will soon be ready for occupancy.

This is one of the biggest construction enterprises carried through in the Magic City for some time, and it will mean a big addition to the progress of Minot. There are several large buildings in the group and the investment runs close to \$100,000. The plant will be used for the distribution of the company's products throughout this section.

MINOT ALSO KICKS
Retail Merchants Protest Against G. N. Train Schedules.
Minot, N. D., Nov. 25.—The Merchants association of Minot decided at a meeting in the association of commerce rooms to file a petition with the Association of Commerce in favor of fighting the proposed changes in the Great Northern railroad schedule which would seriously affect the Minot-Sherwood, Maxbass-Towner and Sarsis-Lakota branches.

The merchants discussed the matter thoroughly and decided that it would be best to put the matter in the hands of Secretary D. B. Hollings, of the Association of Commerce, who has been carrying on a vigorous campaign against the plan to substitute mixed for regular passenger trains.

BIG VERDICT IN SLANDER ACTION

Ashley, N. D., Nov. 25.—Five thousand dollars for slander is the verdict given by a district court jury against John Rieger of this city in favor of F. Sprenger, also of this city. 

DOBEL BETTER
Minot Truck Driver May Recover from Injuries.
Minot, N. D., Nov. 25.—M. E. Dobell, motor truck driver for J. B. Read, who was seriously injured while unloading a heavy heating coil at the new Lincoln school on the north side, is said to be feeling much better at St. Joseph's hospital. Dobell's recovery is assured, it is said.

Ed. Rippley, the colored man who was shot through the legs by Morgan Rhoades after Rhoades fatally wounded Griffin Skinner in the restaurant of Oster Webb two weeks ago, is in St. Joseph's hospital, but will be able to leave soon, according to the physician in charge of his case.

NEW CITY HALL
Being Planned at McKenzie County Seat Says Report.
Schafer, N. D., Nov. 25.—A committee has been named to raise the additional funds needed to insure a city hall. The place is not only required for public meetings but for the use of the different local organizations, like the band and some of the secret societies. It is thought that by raising \$1,000 in addition to the funds on hand a suitable place can be arranged.

TRAPPER FINED
Manning Man Sentenced for Operating Out of Season.
Manning, N. D., Nov. 25.—In Justice Brown's court, Herbert Harris paid a fine and costs amounting in all to \$24.20 for trapping muskrats out of season. At the same time Olaf Olson paid a fine and costs amounting to \$22.35 for shooting a prairie chicken out of season. The charges and arrest were made at the instigation of District Deputy Game Warden T. N. Hartung of Dickinson, who visited the homes of the boys near Oakdale. The boys appeared voluntarily before the court and entered a plea of guilty. The case against J. D. Harris was dismissed, it being shown that the pelts found on his premises belonged to his son, who plead guilty to the trapping. This is the first case ever brought up in Dunn county for violation of the game laws.

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 25.—An incoming train crew reported that they had seen the body of a man lying near the tracks of the Northern Pacific about one and one-half miles west of Fargo. Dr. Sorkness, who was notified, at once got a rig and drove to the spot where he found the man in an unconscious condition lying close to the track. He returned and placed him in a local hospital, where he died Saturday evening without regaining consciousness.

Father of Devils Lake Women dies at Lisbon Home.
Devils Lake, N. D., Nov. 25.—Word was received of the death of Timothy Riordan, father of Mrs. Wm. Devaney and Mrs. Mary Snook of this city. The remains will be shipped here and funeral arrangements will be completed. The deceased was 74 years of age, and besides these two daughters has a son in St. Paul and a son in the west. He was an old soldier and has been an inmate of the soldiers' home at Lisbon.
