### "JIMTOWN" CLIMBING

#### Population Shows Large Growth Since Last Census.

Jamestown, N. D., Dec. 1.—The population of Jamestown today is 8,907, the figures being obtained from a house-to-house canvass by George P. Keister, the expert city directory compiler. The census shows a fine growth in the past two years when the last directory was issued, and more fairly represents Jamestown's population than the federal census of 1910. The next state census will be taken in 1915.

The sound burst one of his ear drums and his face was bruised up pretty badly by the flying particles.

### TRANSIENT STARVING

#### Thought Insane When Picked Up by Wells County Authorities.

Fessenden, N. D., Dec. 1.—A transient, who later gave his name as Charles Massey, appeared at the residence of E. E. Larson, near Wellsburg, and asked for something to eat. He acted rather queer, but being insistent was given a loaf of bread, two cups of coffee and other food. This was about 11 o'clock. He complained for dinner and appeared to be just as hungry as the rest of the family. His actions were such as to cause some alarm, so the authorities were notified and he was brought to Fessenden. Since then it has been ascertained that he had been without anything to eat for a long spell and this with exposure caused his condition, and the authorities believe he will not be adjudged insane.

### BOY KILLED

#### Speed of Train Underestimated by Young Monksbridge.

Jamestown, N. D., Dec. 1.—Albert Monksbridge, a young man, was struck by the engine of Northern Pacific No. 1 at Eldridge Sunday night and instantly killed. He was crossing the track with two other boys and stopped to jump back and forth, evidently trying to see how long he could remain before the train reached the spot. His remains were taken to Ada, Minn., where his parents reside, for burial. He was 20.

### ST. PETER HELD

#### Apostolically Named Gentleman is Charged With Bootlegging.

Fessenden, N. D., Dec. 1.—At a hearing in county court Alfred St. Peter, a gentleman, appeared upon a charge of bootlegging and was fined \$100. He was bound over for trial at the next term of district court. St. Peter was caught at Wellsburg by Sheriff J. N. Kunkel.

### MAIL SACK FOUND

#### Government Pouch Picked Up by Mandan Hunters.

Mandan, N. D., Dec. 1.—Clyde Dow and Clifford Thorberg, who were out hunting along Heart river discovered a United States mail sack along the channel near the second crossing. The sack had been ripped open and envelopes opened up and their contents rifled. The boys brought the pouch and contents into the Mandan school house on Monday. The mail indicates that it was a pouch labeled for Glen Ullitt and mail routes out of that city. It was evidently lost or stolen from train on September 23 and has been lying there ever since.

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### FAIR PLANNED

#### Meeting of Committee Held at Minot—Dates Arranged.

Minot, N. D., Dec. 1.—A meeting of the midwinter fair committee was held and plans were laid for the big event which will probably be held January 25 to 30 inclusive. Mr. Reynolds, who was a prominent resident of Minneapolis, was stricken with paralysis and never regained consciousness. He was about 60 years old and a prominent Scottish Rite Mason. A Masonic funeral was held and the remains taken to Danville, Pa., for burial.
