There is Evidence, at Least, that They May Have been in North Dakota.

### LYCEUM ATTRACTION FRIDAY EVENING

DRAWS VERY LARGE AUDIENCE

The largest audience ever assembled for a lyceum attraction gathered Friday evening in the auditorium to witness the comedy, "The Taming of the Shrew" by the Arden Drama company.

This fact is indicative of the appreciation of the lyceum public of the best things in the field of drama, and should encourage the organization of high grade companies like the Ardens.

The William Winter cutting of the play was used in last night's production. This adaptation proved a most rollicking comedy, and the brilliancy of the lines delighted the listeners.

"The Taming of the Shrew" was staged in true Elizabethan style, of stage settings and scenery there were none, unless one might so term the two curtains and the placard which was used. Signs which explicitly read "This is ye Garden of Papiasts" or "This is a room in ye House of Petruchio" were hung at the rear of the stage.

Far from detracting from the performance, this stroke of "ye Good Old Times" lent a peculiar charm. Such was the skill of the actors, and so real an atmosphere did they create, that the audience quickly lent themselves to the mood and accepted the compliment thus paid to their understanding and imaginative ability. The costuming and make-up generally was adequate but not overdone.

A happy combination of drama and music made up the performance, vocal numbers being presented during the intermissions of the play.

Katheryn, the Invincible, yet lovely, found a splendid interpreter in her impossible self in Miss Mary Tomlinson, who fitted the part in physical and temperamental make-up to perfection. One particularly well done feature of her performance was the manner in which she revealed the more lovely side of the shrew's nature. This at once enticed the audience's sympathies when one realizes the big cuts made by William Winter. Miss Tomlinson, however, negotiated the rapid changes in Katheryn's character in a generally admirable way. The symmetry of her work was accentuated by the richness of her well selected costumes.

To the part of Kat's fine Mr. Shoemaker formed an unusually good foil in the role of Petruchio. His work was at once commanding and intellectually strong. His ideas to the audience were pointed and clever. In general his characterization was powerful.

The soprano solos by Miss Mohr consisted of a group of old English songs and a group of Schubert's songs with color and interpreted entirely satisfactorily. Miss Mohr and Mr. Leek, formerly of Grand Forks, presented a number of duets, which were well chosen and admirably done. In his solo, Mr. Leek displayed a voice of power and good quality. ### COMMENDS USE OF BRITISH MARINES

#### Despatching of Force to Antwerp of Great Value, Declares French.

London, Dec. 7.—Field Marshal Sir John French in a dispatch covering the report of General Archibald Paris, who commanded the British naval brigade at Antwerp gives further testimony to the good effect the sending that force to the assistance of the Belgians had on the allies' campaign generally and thus further supports the action of Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty who had been criticized for sending it. General French says:

"Although the results did not include the actual saving of the fortress, the action of the force under General Paris certainly delayed the enemy for a considerable time and assisted the Belgian army to be withdrawn in a condition to enable it to reorganize and regain its value as a fighting force."

"The destruction of war material and ammunition which but for the intervention of this force would have proved of great value to the enemy was thus able to be carried out. The assistance which the Belgian army has rendered throughout the subsequent course of operations on the canal and Yser river has been a valuable asset to the allied cause and such help must be regarded as the outcome of the intervention of General Paris' force."

"I am further of the opinion that the moral effect produced on the minds of the Belgian army by this necessary course of operations on the canal and Yser river before it was too late, has been of great value to their use and efficiency as a fighting force."

General Paris in his report says the capture of some of his brigade and the interment in Holland of others was due to the fact that the roads were crowded with refugees, to fatigue, and partly to "at present unexplained causes."

When Antwerp was bombarded, General Paris says the water supply was cut off and the whole city had been destroyed by fire had there been any wind.
