

GUNMEN SHOOT VICTIM AT DOOR

Minneapolis Politician Killed Saturday Night by Unknown Men.

Minneapolis, Dec. 14.—Clara Clauson, 1912 Tenth avenue S., who was a candidate two years ago for alderman in the Fifth ward, was shot and killed at 11:30 o'clock Saturday night by an unknown man who called him to the door of his home and shot him down. One bullet went through the scalp, one through the shoulder and one through the body just below the heart.

Mystery surrounds the murder. Clauson died a minute after the shooting. The only words he spoke were, "I am dying, call a doctor."

Clauson, who was the owner of the property at 1912 Tenth avenue, has been boarding there with Mrs. W. Hamburg, his tenant, Mrs. Hamburg, Thomas Hamburg, her son, and Mr. Clauson had retired at 11 p. m. At 11:30 the door bell rang violently.

Clauson arose, slipped on a dressing gown and called to Thomas Hamburg, who occupies an adjoining room, asking him what he thought the noise was. Hamburg replied that it was the door bell.

Questions the intruder. Clauson left his room, descended the stairs and was heard by Hamburg to call out, "Who is there?"

Hamburg again heard Clauson's voice, he said, but heard no answer. Clauson threw back the door and

Hamburg heard more words but couldn't distinguish them. There was a short scuffle followed by three shots in quick succession.

Hamburg darted out of his room and down the stairs. He found Clauson reeling about the hallway.

Clauson fell into Hamburg's arms, saying, "I am dying, call a doctor," and collapsed. Hamburg assisted him upstairs and to a lounge in his room, but Clauson lived only a few seconds.

Police Captain A. Weira and Detectives William F. Fox, J. W. Bezaulson and J. F. Stavio went to the scene of the murder. Patrolmen W. H. Curtin and L. Thornd of the police department arrived about the same time.

Fred Schneider, driver of the police automobile, found a number of people gathered about the house when he drove up. He heard some one say that two men had run away from the place after the shots were fired, and that they ran into the alley and made their way toward Bloomingtown avenue, where there is a street car line.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE. The American Journal of Clinical Medicine laments the good old times and the changing ways of women.

"Does any spinster now spin? Or any daughter (milk) nor milk? Or brew, bake, weave, wash, iron, gather, make clothes, knit, or do any of the housewife's work as in the days of 'good Queen Bees'?"

The editor glorifies housework, and advocates a "four years' course in domestic science, the diploma of which alone will entitle the girl to a marriage license."

This calls out from Mrs. Fannie H. Rastall a letter saying that women love home beyond anything else, but they want a more adequate return for their labor.

"Though working hard, not from sun to sun, but hours before and after the sun rises and sets, at a variety of occupations, each one of which constitutes a separate business or profession when taken out of the home, she has no financial return whatever. She is treated as a perpetual minor."

WEAKNESS AGAIN FEATURES MARKET

Minneapolis, Dec. 14.—During the early part of the session the wheat market ruled very strong and Max wheat sold up to \$1.18 1/2. Later in the day the market turned very weak, prices broke during the latter part of the session.

There was a 20c increase in the United States whole crop wheat to \$8.80 a bushel. The increase was helped to break the market.

Clearance from the coast of wheat and flour today equaled 1,745,000 bushels. Primary movement of wheat today 1,882,000 bushels compared with 1,850,000 bushels one year ago, shipments today 677,000 bushels, one year ago 445,000 bushels.
