CHARLES WILSON, OF FORUM, IS DEAD

Fargo, Dec. 19.—Charles Wilson, one of the pioneer newspaper men of North Dakota, and one that numbered among his acquaintances men in nearly every section of the state, died at his home, 624 Ninth street south, at 6 o'clock this morning.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from the German Methodist church. The body will be taken to Chicago on Saturday afternoon, where interment will be made, Chicago being Mrs. Wilson's home.

MRS. BLOOM'S NAME AGAIN SUBMITTED

Washington, Dec. 19.—President Wilson threw another bombshell into the senate Friday when he renominated Mrs. Marjorie Bloom to be postmistress at Devils Lake, N. D.

That Mrs. Bloom's nomination will again be rejected is to be assured. It will be opposed now, as it was in the first instance, by Senator Gronna of North Dakota, who, it is stated, is making the fight on the request of citizens of Devils Lake.

THREE KINGS MET TO TALK OF WAR

Malmos, Sweden, Dec. 19.—King Gustave of Sweden, King Haakon of Norway, and King Christian of Denmark, spent the greater part of Friday here in a conference, formulating an agreement designed to combine their respective interests during the period of the war.

It was the first time the rulers had met since Norway severed her connection with Sweden in 1905. The conference is expected to establish closer relations between these countries.

DIAMOND THIEF LANDED AT PEC

Crook Has Been Missing Since 1911—Stole \$5,000 Worth of Gems.

Winnipeg, Dec. 19.—Henry Reich, a diamond salesman employed by Frank & Steinberg, Detroit, Mich., was arrested here last night charged with the theft of \$5,000 in jewels from the firm in June, 1911.

He has been living here two years. He decamped from Detroit and the search has gone on for him some years. He was part of the time in Belgium. When arrested here he was domiciled in a fashionable apartment. He has been traveling for a local jewelry firm for some months.

VILLA FORCES DECLARED IN REVOLT

San Antonio, Texas, Dec. 19.—A dispatch received by the local Mexican consul today says: "The Villa garrison at San Luis Potosi resolved against Villa this morning, surrendering the city to General Samuel DeLos Santos, who is loyal to Carranza."

THIRTY INJURED IN TROLLEY SMASH

Kansas City, Dec. 19.—Thirty persons were injured, many dangerously, today when a street car loaded with Christmas shoppers, collided with an interurban car. A split switch caused the accident. The motorman of the interurban car probably will die.

MRS. COBB FREED AFTER LONG TERM

Hartford, Conn., Dec. 19.—Mrs. Kate Cobb of Norwich, confined in the state prison for nearly 56 years for the murder of her husband, has been granted a pardon by the state board of pardons. She is 66 years old and was sentenced to life imprisonment in 1878.

The pardoning of Mrs. Cobb recalls one of the most sensational crimes in the annals of Connecticut courts. Her husband, Charles Cobb, was a tax collector of the city of Norwich. He was found dead in January, 1879.

The coroner's inquest showed that both Cobb and Mrs. Bishop had died of poisoning under suspicious circumstances. Mrs. Cobb and Bishop were arrested, and it developed in the evidence, after a remarkable trial, that the two had planned separate murders so that they might be free to marry.

The evidence, however, was mostly circumstantial, and it was not until Bishop turned state's evidence that the motive and details were brought out. Both were sentenced to life imprisonment. Bishop died in prison two years ago.

\$13,000 OF LOOT SENT BY PARCEL POST

Cincinnati, Dec. 19.—The thirteen thousand dollars obtained by Frank Kohl, the bandit who yesterday robbed two banks and was later killed, after fatally wounding a policeman, or at least part of it, was shipped by parcel post to Louisville, Ky., by the robbers.

This was ascertained by the detectives. The postmaster at Louisville has been notified to be on the lookout for the package.

RIOT CHARGED TO SEATTLE RAIDERS

Seattle, Dec. 18.—The prosecution of thirty-eight unemployed men, arrested last night after raiding a downtown lunch room, will be sought under the state riot law, it has been decided by the authorities.

The accused rioters, now jailed, formed part of a mob of two hundred that terrorized the patrons and proprietors of a dairy lunch, taking all the food in sight. They attempted to wreck the city prison after being locked up.

WELSH ROYAL SINGERS PLAN CONCERT TO AID BELGIAN RELIEF FUND

A concert for the benefit of the Belgian war sufferers will probably be given in this city January 17 by the Welsh Royal Welsh singers, according to plans now being made by Dr. J. D. Taylor, in charge of the local relief work.

The singers are to pass through Grand Forks on that date, and have offered to give the concert, if a hall will be provided by the citizens. If this is done the admission fee will be nominal, or it may be decided to depend on a collection.

The amount which has been subscribed in the city up to date is \$1,251.25.

U. S. SURGEONS GO TO EUROPE

New York, Dec. 19.—Three more surgeons will be sent to Europe for hospital service tomorrow by the American Red Cross, it was announced tonight. Dr. C. A. Smier, who sailed on the steamer Potsdam for Rotterdam, is a graduate of Cornell university medical college (1905), and has since practiced surgery in Erie, Okla.

He will be third assistant staff officer at the Imperial and Royal reserve hospital No. 8 at Vienna.

The two surgeons who will sail on the steamer Dwinck for Russia are Dr. John Mann and Dr. T. Lyle Hazlett. Dr. Mann is a graduate of the medical college of the University of Virginia, and has had experience in New York city and Norfolk, Va., hospitals. He has been practicing since 1897. Dr. Hazlett has been practicing medicine in Pittsburgh since his graduation from the university in that city, and is a member of the staff of the South Side hospital there.

TO BE WINED AND DINED. Paris, Dec. 19.—M. Millerand, the minister of war, has drawn up a menu for the New Year's dinner for the soldiers. The dinner will consist of ham, sausage, apples, half a liter of wine, and a cigar extra for each man serving in the ranks. There will be a liter bottle of champagne for every four soldiers, so that over a million corks will pop at the Germans from the trenches.

FORTUNE JURY FAILS TO AGREE

Bismarck Police Chief's case Results in No Verdict.

Bismarck, N. D., Dec. 19.—The jury in the case of George Fortune, formerly chief of police, who is charged with grand larceny, it being alleged that he took goods and money from a Greek peddler, reported a disagreement this morning, after being out over 24 hours. It is rumored the votes stood eight to four for acquittal. The jury was discharged.
