Rebel Leader Executed. London, Dec. 21.—A Reuter dispatch from Pretoria tells of the first military execution of a rebel leader involved in the uprisings in British South Africa, which followed the outbreak of the European war. Captain Fourie was shot after being convicted of treason. His brother, Lieutenant Fourie, also was condemned to death, but the sentence was commuted to imprisonment for five years following the captain's admission he had induced his brother to join the rebellion. Both men had been officers of the South Africa defense force and, being Boers, were tried by a court martial composed of Boers. The captain met death with fortitude.
