CHARTER FIGHT WILL SEE SUPREME COURT

ORDINANCES ARE LOST LAST NIGHT

Council Has Adjourned Session and Considers Important Question.

The East Grand Forks charter case, which is being argued again this afternoon, will be carried to the supreme court of the state before it is finally settled.

This is made clear in a resolution passed last night at an adjourned meeting of the city council, in which the council declares that should the ordinance be submitted to the supreme court of this state, and such steps be taken so that the earliest determination may be secured as to the means and methods by which such home rule charter may properly and legally be submitted to a vote.

This adjourned meeting, the two ordinances—on extending the patrol limits and the other extending the fire limits—were killed. The vote was 3 to 2 on each. It is necessary to have four votes to carry any measure.

Aldermen Liston and Nelson voted against the ordinances, and Aldermen Barlow, Culliton and Logan voted for them. Aldermen Byrd was absent.

The resolution amending the charter question declares the willingness of the council to submit it to a vote of the people when certain points of law are cleared up. These points are the same as were brought out in the arguments on the writ of mandamus last week, and are: Whether the charter must be filed with the mayor within six months after the appointment of the commission; whether it must in all cases be submitted at a general election when one occurs within six months after the date of filing; whether it can be submitted at a special election called within 90 days after the date of filing when the general election has occurred within a period of six months; and whether it can be submitted at any time at a special election after the general election when such general election has occurred within six months after date of filing.

After setting forth these points, the resolution says: "Be it resolved that the city council of the city of East Grand Forks express their willingness and readiness to submit such home rule charter to the vote of the electors at such time as they can legally so do, and be it so ordered."
