STATEWIDE PROHIBITION. Des Moines, Feb. 12.—The senate adopted the constitutional amendment, providing state-wide prohibition. The measure now goes to the house. WANT INTERSTATE CORPORATION LAWS. Boston, Feb. 12.—The passage of a national incorporation law applicable to interstate corporations, especially to railroads, was urged by Samuel Undermyer of New York in an address before the Boston University Law School Association. Mr. Undermyer characterized present laws regulating corporations as chaotic and inefficient, and said that lawyers were responsible for this condition. He suggested that the interstate commerce commission or the railroad commissions of the states should be given power to procure directors on behalf of stockholders for the recovery of money lost or diverted in the management of corporations, in conformity with the plan now used by the comptroller of the currency over national banks. The approval of the Interstate Commerce commission should be necessary before the financial arrangements of receivers for insolvent industrial corporations and reorganization of the corporations should be under the supervision of the commission. PUPILS RECALLED. Geneva, Switzerland, Feb. 12. (via Paris)—American students and school children who remained in German universities and schools at the wish of their parents despite the war, now are being recalled. A number of scholars from Munich and Dresden passed through Geneva last night for Paris. RELEASED ON BAIL. Denver, Col., Feb. 12.—W. T. Hickory and Ell Cross, officers of the Colorado State Federation of Labor, arrested on grand jury warrants issued at Walsenburg, charged with murder in connection with the disturbances in the recent coal miners' strike, were released on bail at Pueblo on bail, it was announced today at district headquarters of the United Mine Workers of America. Bond was furnished for each of the men in the sum of \$10,000. FOUR ARE DEAD. Abilene, Tex., Feb. 12.—Four members of the J. T. Garrison family, near Anson, Texas, are dead, and four others seriously ill from poisoning by bread made from milk contained in a rusty tin vessel. FANNY CROSBY DEAD. WEALTHY MAN AND HIS WIFE KILLED. Murdered by Burglars—Four Dead From Poisoning by Bread. Oakland, Cal., Feb. 12.—Jacob Vogel, former president of the Citizens' Bank of Fruitvale, and his wife, were found murdered in their home at Fruitvale, a suburb. They were beaten to death by burglars, who first trussed them up with ropes and Mrs. Vogel's apron strings. Vogel was rated very wealthy. NO ATTACHMENTS TO BULGARIAN LOAN. London, Feb. 12.—It is officially stated on behalf of Bulgaria that no political engagements whatsoever are attached to the financial arrangements concluded with German bankers by Bulgaria. The loan, it is announced, was arranged before the war and in return Germany obtained important economic concessions, including the building to Lagos, an Aegan port of Bulgaria, the construction of the port itself and a railway line connecting the sea with the Bulgarian railway system. In addition, Germany obtained a concession for the exploitation of the Pernik coal mine, the richest in Bulgaria. The announcement adds that Bulgaria's policy remains one of strict and loyal neutrality. LEGISLATION NEEDED. Providence, R. I., Feb. 12.—The necessity for legislation permitting the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad to finance its operations today has predicted disaster for the road unless the desired legislation should be enacted. He added that if the company should go into bankruptcy credit all over the world would be affected. COMMISSION ABOLISHED. Carson City, Nev., Feb. 12.—By a vote of 40 to 10, three not voting, the assembly passed the bill establishing a racing commission. The bill amending the anti-gambling law, known as the pari-mutual bill, was made a special order of business for next Monday. The six months divorce bill already passed by the assembly was defeated 13 to 8 in the senate.

East Grand Forks CANNOT SETTLE AND THEN SUE. Supreme Court Decides Important Case in Favor of the Crookston Lumber Company. A man cannot make a settlement for personal injuries and then go into court and get additional compensation according to a decision of the supreme court yesterday. The court ordered judgment for the Crookston Lumber company in a case in which Archie Valley, one of their employes, received a verdict for \$1,150, after having settled for \$1,350. Settled With Company. He was injured by being thrown from a portable water tank of the lumber company, while working in the woods in Beltrami county. In a hospital at Bemidji it was found that one of his legs would be shortened as a result of the accident. Knowing this, Valley accepted a settlement when he left the hospital. Affirmed the Compromise. He put his money in the bank and withdrew it from time to time for five months after leaving the hospital. When his money was gone he began suit in Polk county district court. The jury awarded him damages. The court held that Valley affirmed the compromise with the company's attorney by spending his money so that he could not return it if he later wished to sue. The syllabus follows: 1. Opinions expressed by one contracting party to another upon doubtful questions of law, arising in the course of compromise of a disputed claim, are not actionable representations even though the person giving the opinion be an attorney at law. 2. A party to a compromise cannot rescind it for fraud where he knowingly and voluntarily uses and enjoys the benefits of the compromise after being fully advised of the facts.
