Charley Cutler, whose story follows, is Grand Forks boy. He grew up in this city, spending his childhood here...

(By Charles Cutler, American wrestling champion and the man who discovered Jess Willard.)

I am just as pleased over Jess Willard's victory as a proud father is of his first child learning to walk.

When I first met Willard in St. Louis, where I was wrestling Paul Samson about three years ago, he impressed me regardless of his unsteady appearance...

He wore a boy's size coat stretched over his long, but well proportioned body, and his trousers lacked about four inches of reaching his shoe tops.

He explained to me that he was determined to become champion of the world, although he had traveled a rough road up to that time.

I told him that I might be able to help him get started in the right direction if he would come on to Chicago, which he did on the advice of Harry Morris, the promoter of the wrestling bout...

Upon arriving in Chicago we went up to see Bill O'Connell, the veteran gym owner, and Bill passed favorably upon Jess. I had a great deal of confidence in Bill's judgment...

In his first workout I was made the butt of many jokes and one spectator offered to get Bill Squires for me and another volunteered to go and call up Ed Dukerhorst...

he could beat Willard if I would assure him that his right name was Willard, and a bantamweight was just who fought Kid McCoy.

Willard was very awkward at first, but determined to make good, and he got it made. He lacked confidence in his own ability...

One point in Jess' favor, he did not try to knock out any of his boxing partners, and a bantamweight was just as safe from danger in boxing with the big fellow as he would be in jail.

This same trait led many to believe that he did not have any punch, and I was unaware of his terrific force until I saw him knock Bull Young, a man weighing 240 pounds, three feet in the air and turned him over for a half somersault...

It was in a bout with Willard in Los Angeles later that this same Young met with a accident that ended fatally and came near depriving the white race of a man that was capable of wrestling the boxing crown from Jack Johnson, as Jess was thinking seriously of quitting the ring for good at that time.

Managing fighters is not my business, and although I was loath to let Willard go, I was glad to see him perfectly willing to hand over the managerial reins to more capable hands, had Willard expressed a desire that I do so, as I realize that I am taking Jess as far as I was capable.

Many newspaper friends all joined in and gave him a lot of publicity. I taught him what I knew about boxing and I knew that his determination would ultimately make him champion.

While I am the loser of many thousands of dollars, I do not mind it, with a contract, I am glad that he won the title and that Tom Jones is entitled to credit for getting him the chance to fight Johnson.
