1,000 CANADIAN CASUALTY LIST; BERLIN SAYS 1,000 ARE PRISONERS

Big Casualty List.
Ottawa, April 25.—Canada has received her first great casualty list from the fighting at the front. It records the death in action of 21 officers, including three lieutenant-colonels, two of whom were in command of regiments, and one on the permanent staff. In addition, 66 officers have died of their wounds and are on the list of wounded. This list is to be noted, is not a complete list, and there is no record so far of non-commissioned officers or privates killed or wounded in the heavy fighting of Thursday, Friday and Saturday, which is still going on. The British estimate is ten men every 100 men. This would bring the total Canadian casualties up to 800.

The fight was a terrible one, and, though the Canadians suffered heavily, there is every indication that the division covered itself with glory and acquitted itself in a gallant manner. All day long messages of congratulation have been coming in to the prime minister and the minister of militia testifying in unequalled terms to the splendid part which the Canadian troops played in the action.

Firm's Great Battle.
London, April 26.—Under the caption "Avenge the Canadians," a Morning Post correspondent, describing "Friday's" action, says this battle is unique as being the first great event of the kind in Canadian history. For the Canadian troops can claim it as their own and the glory of it. They were holding the extreme left of the British line. Preparing ground by means of their poison bombs, Germans driving through Langemarck and Pilken, forced a passage across the canal between Steenstraete and Hetzels, reaching the village of Lisserne.

Emperor Nicholas Visits Fortress of Przemysl

Amsterdam (via London), April 26.—Dispatches from Berlin state that Emperor William sent the following telegram to Admiral Von Tirpitz, minister of marine and admiral of the fleet:

"On the fiftieth anniversary of your entering the naval service, I express to you my heartiest congratulations, also my pleasure that, with God's help, it was granted you to celebrate this day still in active service and full of vigor. I readily embrace this opportunity to assure you of my deepest gratitude for your great services rendered to the fatherland by the successful extension of the navy. With justified pride you can look today on this your life work, the importance of which the present war has strikingly shown. As a sign of my gratitude, I confer on you the grand commander of the royal house, order of the house of Hohenzollern."

Emperor Congratulates General Von Tirpitz

Petrograd, (via London), April 26.—Dispatches from Lemberg, Galicia, state that Emperor Nicholas, accompanied by Grand Duke Nicholas and his staff, visited Przemysl on Friday. The emperor also stopped at Sambor, where he inspected the guard of honor commanded by General Brusiloff. The emperor thanked the soldiers for their faithful services and distributed the cross of St. George.

Austrians Lay Claims to New Success in Mountains

Vienna, via London, April 26.—The following official communication was issued by the Austria war office last night:

"On the Carpathian front, in the Orawa valley, near Kozlowa, we have gained a new success. After a Sap attack, executed with the greatest daring, our troops yesterday stormed the heights of Ostry, to the south of Kozlowa. Simultaneous Austro-German troops succeeded in gaining ground on, and to the south of road 82, which the Russians had captured.

"With the capture of Ostry height and Zwinin Ridge, was taken at the commencement of April the reduction of the Russian positions, which had been stubbornly defended for months on both sides of the Orawa valley, is now accomplished.

German Movement Hidden From Eye of Neutrals

London, April 25.—The German rushes in Flanders and the Wever, where they claim to have had considerable success, are believed to be the forerunners of another big effort to break through the allied lines in the west.

Two German Attacks Checked by British


Paris, April 26, (via London).—The French war office this afternoon issued the following:

Prominent Politicians Say Italy is Ready

Paris, April 26.—A friend and brother officer of Peppino Garibaldi informed the Petit Journal that Garibaldi had gained the impression from interviews with the Italian minister Emanuel Salandra, the foreign minister to Sonnino, and prominent politicians of Italy would be ready to sign a peace treaty with the allies before parliament convenes in May.

Englishmen Organize to Raise Funds for Belgians

London, April 26.—An influential committee for Belgian relief has been organized and has issued an appeal to the public for funds. This committee is composed of many well known Englishmen of all creeds, proposes to raise money, but explains it to be a distributed form of relief through the American commission for Belgian relief. Two German Attacks Checked by British

Paris, April 26, (via London).—The French war office this afternoon issued the following:

"On the heights of Meuse fighting developing. An attack on the Calonne trench, reported yesterday, was checked by our counter-attack and the enemy to the east, in the direction of the St. Remy, are evidently striving to recapture Lezperghe.

"A violent bombardment, preceded by fierce bombardment, took place shortly after this movement on the eastern slopes of the position at Lezperghe, but the German attack resulted in a failure.

Italy Must Intervene or Lose Everything

Rome, April 26.—(via Paris).—The opinion prevails in parliamentary circles that if no decision regarding Italy's participation in the war is reached previous to May 12, when the chamber of deputies reconvenes, parliament will be prorogued.

International questions could not be discussed in parliament while they are still under negotiation, it is argued.

Referring to the international financial situation created by the war, the Giornale D'Italia says:

"This war, which is devouring Europe, is a magnificent thing financially for the United States.

An energetic campaign is being conducted in the Italian press on behalf of the allies. Every day appears telegrams from Petrograd warning Italy that if she does not soon intervene she will lose everything. It is said the allies decided to give nothing in case they are victorious to neutral power which, in the words of Jules Cambon, a French diplomat, rushes to succor the victor.
