Value of Mark Falls. Paris, April 29.—A dispatch from Geneva says the value of the German mark continues to fall and that the Swiss postal authorities have announced that after May 1 German postal orders will be canceled on the basis of 110 centimes to the mark, a depreciation of 12 per cent.

Overcome the Gas Bombs. Havre, France, 29.—Aphyxiating bombs used by the Germans in their attacks Monday night against the Belgian positions had little effect because preventive measures had been taken by the Belgians who had been advised of the effects produced by the gas.

Undertaking Uncertain. Paris, April 29.—The offensive assumed by the Germans in the Ypres region has given rise to the report that they are about to undertake another carefully planned attempt to force their way to Calais.

Notify Relatives First. Ottawa, Ont., April 29.—In giving out a list of more than fifty names of non-commissioned officers and privates wounded or missing in the battle of Vimy, the Canadian militia department today explained why the casualty list contains the names of those who are next of kin.

French and Russian Forces at Dardanelles About 80,000. Berlin, April 29.—Advice from Constantinople to the Overseas News Agency says that the French and British attempted to land at the Dardanelles numbered about 80,000.

East Grand Forks POLK PRISONERS AFTER PARDONS

W. H. Pedkerin, Connected with Kjormoe Murder here a Few Years Ago, is One.

W. H. Pedkerin, who pleaded guilty to the January, 1912, murder of Ole Kjormoe, whose body was found at the rear of an East Grand Forks saloon in November, 1911, is seeking a pardon.

Alexander LaPlante, who pleaded guilty to arson in connection with the fire which damaged the Crookston opera house, leased by A. J. Kavanaugh of Grand Forks, also wants a pardon.

The Kjormoe murder case is well known to local residents. Pedkerin, Dale and Hawkins, who were in the saloon, were given him a drink of beer in which they had put "four drops of chloral." After he had become unconscious, they searched his pockets but found only 80 cents.

Later, they put Kjormoe out of the saloon, but in doing so one of them struck him over the head with a beer bottle. This blow, it is said, and the chloral, killed him.
