

PRZEMYSL AGAIN FALLS IN HANDS OF THE AUSTRIANS

BUT ONE QUESTION PUT BY GERMANY TO BE GIVEN ATTENTION

WILSON IS NOT SWERVED FROM HIS POSITION

President Continues His Preparation of the Note to the Germans.

VISIT BY COUNT GIVES INFORMATION

Likely to Result in Berlin Foreign Office Getting Better Line on What the United States Thinks of Lusitania Incident.

Washington, June 3.—President Wilson worked most of the day on the new note to Germany. The situation has developed to a point where, although the visit of Count Bernstorff, the German ambassador, to the president yesterday, is believed likely to enlighten the Berlin foreign office on the attitude of the United States, American government, is unwavering from its intentions to determine promptly whether German aggressions will hereafter respect the principles of the international law.

It is understood the note will state that the Lusitania was on a peaceful cruise, did not resist capture and was unarmed. All other points raised by Germany will be deemed irrelevant under the laws of nations.

THREE CARGOES OF COTTON HELD

All Ships Were Bound From America to Different Points of Europe.

London, June 3.—The American steamer Nebuchadnezzar, which carries 3,000 tons of cotton was detained by the British authorities, has been released on the promise that the Netherlands government would take charge of the consignments.

MURDERERS ARE FINALLY CAUGHT

Posse of Over a Hundred Men Run Them Down Near Scene of Crime.

Erie, Pa., June 3.—After a running fight which lasted practically all day, with a posse composed of more than a hundred men, two men who shot and perhaps fatally wounded Richard Mack, a wealthy farmer, near Waterford, Pa., were captured late yesterday in a wood eight miles from the scene of the crime.

WILD TIME IN TOKYO; ATTEMPT PROVES FAILURE

Resolution Expressing Lack of Confidence Brings on Hot Session.

Tokyo, June 3.—A resolution introduced in the house of representatives yesterday by the opposition, expressing lack of confidence in the present administration, was rejected today by a vote of 133 to 232.

Extreme disorder marked the session. All members of the cabinet were in their seats.

The resolution as introduced yesterday charged the cabinet with having failed in negotiations with China from the beginning, and with having aroused suspicion of foreign powers and with having harmed the prestige of empire.

BELIEVE REFERENDUM MOVEMENT IS FAILURE; PETITIONS MAY BE ILLEGAL; IN DESPERATE STRAITS

Supporters Circularize Grand Forks in Eleventh Hour in Effort to Obtain Signers—Still Thousands Short, With Only a Few Hours of Grace.

Bismarck, N. D., June 3.—Referendum petitions continue coming into Secretary of State Hall, and compilations at noon today indicate some bills will be referred, and others will not.

Belief that the movement for the referendum of fourteen acts passed by the last legislature has failed, prevails throughout the state as a result of the remarkable energetic efforts that are being made in several sections to procure additional signers to referendum petitions.

Blank petitions have been distributed broadcast, and with them has been circulated a statement giving the reasons for the reference of the acts that have been attacked.

Red Cross Makes Appeal For Starving Mexico; Conditions in That Nation Depicted as Terrible

Washington, June 3.—An appeal to the Red Cross from the international relief committee in Mexico City, sent through the Brazilian minister here, was made public here. It reads as follows:

"The situation in this city is desperate on account of the shortage of food and medical supplies. Regular railway service between Mexico City and the border and Aguan Calientes and the coast has been suspended since February. The imperative need everywhere is corn. We also urgently require beans, flour and medicines. The only hope is from the United States. We are doing everything possible but our resources are entirely inadequate."

CLIMAX OF GERMANIC ALLIES WORK ATTAINED EARLY THIS MORNING IN OBTAINING CONTROL OF CAPITAL

Przemysl has been reclaimed by Austria. The official announcement is made at Vienna that the great Galician fortress, won by the Russians ten weeks ago after a long struggle, has been recaptured with their new Galician campaign which was launched in the drive from Cracow.

While the fall of Przemysl has not been conceded at Petrograd, so far as cable advices show, the latest official statement from the Russian war office admitted the besiegers of the fortress had won some successes, including the capture of two outlying forts to the north.

Dispatches from the Austrian front to Vienna indicate that the attacking forces relied largely on their heavy guns, which they have used effectively all through the Galician campaign.

Rumania's entrance into the war, it is said officially, will be conditioned on such an agreement.

A Milan dispatch says that King Victor Emmanuel of Italy offered his services as intermediary between these nations.

Italian reports of steady progress in the invasion of Austria are disputed in Vienna.

The Austrian war office announces that Italian offensive operations have been unsuccessful and that no material damage has been done by the Italian artillery.

Two Austrian Merchant Ships Reported Sunk. Geneva, Switzerland, June 3.—News dispatches received here declare two Italian torpedo boats yesterday and early this morning entered the Gulf of Trieste, sank two merchant vessels and damaged an Austrian auxiliary cruiser.
