MASONS WILL OWN CITY NEXT WEEK; SHRINE CEREMONIAL THE BIG EVENT

Buffalo Bill to Lead Monster Parade Friday Afternoon—Scottish Rite Reunion Begins Monday—Grand Lodge Meetings the Following Week.

Next week Grand Forks will be the scene of the big Shrine ceremonial. For two weeks, beginning Monday, this city will be the headquarters of Masons from every section of North Dakota.

Friday Kem Temple will hold its first ceremonial in the new temple, and at that time fully 3,000 Shriners will be in Grand Forks. They will come from Duluth, the twin cities and other western places.

The week following the Grand Lodge and the Grand Chapter and the Eastern Star will meet in Grand Forks.

The Scottish Rite reunion begins Monday morning at 9 o'clock and continues through till 6 o'clock Thursday night, when a banquet will be held.

The feature event, so far as the public is concerned, will be the big Shrine parade, which will be held at 4 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Colonel William Cody, better known as Buffalo Bill, will lead the parade, and will have the band of the Grand Chapter of the Eastern Star with him.

The Shrine banquet will be held after the ceremonial, instead of at 6 o'clock Friday. It has been found im-

possible to hold the banquet before the ceremonial, and consequently it will be served after. At least 1,500 people will sit down to that spread.

The Scottish Rite bodies have a class of 412 for the week, and the Shriners will put through at least 350. C. N. Barnes this morning received word that the Osman temple of St. Paul and Zarah temple of Minneapolis have reserved two cars to send their delegation to Grand Forks. The Duluth Shriners are coming to the city in a special train, and the Fargo temple, including their Shrine band and patrol, also will travel to Grand Forks in a special train.

RAILROAD SHOPMEN STRIKE IN MEXICO New York, June 5.—The railroad shopmen at Chihuahua, Mex., have been on strike for several days, causing a stoppage of virtually all freight traffic between Juarez and Chihuahua, according to a Vera Cruz dispatch made public here yesterday by F. S. Elias, Carranza consul general in this city. The telegram follows: "All railroad shopmen at Chihuahua have been out on strike for several days. Freight movement from Juarez south is practically stopped. Yard badly disordered. All kinds of fruit supplies for the Villa territory have been stopped. Minneapolis is still 'sore' at the steel interests. Anyhow the president does not have Congress on his hands now, while he is busy writing letters."
