FARMER BADLY KNIFED IN ROW ON EAST SIDE

Fierce Attack by Finlanders On Auto Party May turn Into Murder.

SEVERAL MEN TAKE PART IN THE FRACAS

Four Men Demand a Dollar Apiece for Shoving Car Out of the Ditch.

Martin Svrstad, a farmer living several miles north of East Grand Forks was horribly cut up about the abdomen and the arm in an attack by two Finlanders in East Grand Forks near the Peavey elevator late last night. Svrstad was taken to a hospital in this city, where he is reported in a critical condition. The hospital authorities were unable to state this afternoon whether or not the man would recover. It is believed, however, that he has a slight chance for his life.

Svrstad, it seems, was driving to his farm with three or four friends when their automobile got stuck in the ditch near the elevator.

Shove the Car Out. Four Finlanders were standing nearby at the time, and the men in the auto asked for assistance to get the machine out. The Finlanders gave the desired aid and succeeded in extricating the machine from the ditch.

They demanded a dollar apiece for shoving the car out of the ditch, and on being refused that amount, the trouble started. Two of the Finlanders fled, and also Svrstad's friends. Two of the remaining Finlanders are then said to have made the attack on Svrstad, one of them drawing a knife and carving him up.

Arrest Suspects. People were attracted to the scene by the cries of the fighting men and the two Finlanders ran away, leaving Svrstad in a pool of blood, and unconscious. Later the police arrested two men in East Grand Forks whose clothing was spattered with blood, and who are believed to have made the brutal attack. They are Finlanders.

Hasen shot and killed William Fender, a civil war veteran at Guthrie, when they quarreled over a swarm of bees.

ACQUITTED OF PLOT

New Orleans, June 30.—Hans Halle and George Sommers, arrested last December charged with conspiracy to ship explosives in violation of the interstate commerce law, were acquitted in federal court here today. When arrested Halle had in his possession a large bomb which the police said he intended to ship consigned to a French steamship at New York. It was set to explode when the vessel was two days out from New York. Sommers was arrested as an accomplice.


