Nearly Year Since E. Toussaint Has Heard From Wife in Belgium But he Has Not Abandoned Hope

Despite the fact that he has heard nothing from or about his wife since last August, when she was reported in a monastery in Belgium, E. Toussaint of this city has not given up all hope of locating her.

Mrs. Toussaint was visiting in Belgium, when the European war broke out, and, for several weeks, Mr. Toussaint could get no word from her. Then, he heard that she, with other refugees, had been taken to a monastery in Belgium. He has since that time been making frequent efforts to get some word to or from her, but to no avail. He appealed to the state department, but no help could be secured there. Letters

have been sent again and again, but apparently they never reached their destination.

Mr. Toussaint realizes that Belgium is a devastated country and that many of its people have been slaughtered, but he cannot believe that his wife was a victim of the German hecatomb.

"I haven't given up hope," he said today. "But still I cannot say she is well. I can say nothing at all; I can't even do anything. I have tried, but I get no results. It is nearly a year now since I heard from her. All I can do is hope."

At one time Mr. Toussaint heard that his wife was in Brussels, with relatives, but he has never been able to confirm such report.

HEYWARD AFTER NEW BOARD JOB

Would Become Secretary of State Regents Board—Taylor at Meeting.

Dr. J. D. Taylor left last night for Bismarck where today he is attending the first meeting of the new board of regents, which will have charge of all the higher educational institutions in the state.

Richard Heyward of this city, and formerly state high school inspector, is one of the candidates for the secretaryship of the board. Charles Brewer of Fargo and Roy Halliday of Bismarck also are mentioned as prominent candidates.

One of the important propositions to come before the board today is the question of securing an educational survey expert to make a study of all the higher institutions of learning. The board is to outline a plan of work, but it likely will not adopt a definite program until the survey is completed.
