ACCIDENT CAUSES INSANITY

Alex Serwatyke, Who Was Hurt in Runaway Two Weeks Ago, Exhibiting Symptoms of Lunacy.

Alex Serwatyke, injured about the head and body in a runaway accident two weeks ago, is exhibiting symptoms of insanity at a local hospital and will undoubtedly be given a hearing before the county board of insanity as soon as he is physically able to leave the institution.

Serwatyke sustained a deep gash in his head at the time of the accident and this is believed to have affected his mind. He has frequent spells of weeping, it is said. A warrant for his arrest for insanity has been issued.

A team drawing a heavy lumber wagon on which Serwatyke had gone riding ran away two weeks ago going north on Fifth street and colliding with a laundry wagon driven by Ed Beyers at the corner of Fifth street and DeMers avenue. Serwatyke, running alongside the runaway, was thrown into the air and caught in the traces and was thrown under the heavy lumber wagon the same passing over him. Beyers was only slightly hurt.

ROASTING WOMEN ON NEW STYLES

Berlin, July 9.—The Frankfurter Zeitung publishes a protest against the lack of patriotism of German women "who are following the new fashion of wearing full skirts." The extra cloth required by the new fashion, explains the journal, could be put to better use.

"It is quite possible that the full skirts are more sensible and more economical in an effort to stop them, adopt this new fashion at the precise moment when we have to be very economical in our use of wool and cotton? A simple calculation will show that it takes twice as much material to make a skirt as it did a year ago, and if one multiplies this increased consumption by the number of ladies who follow the fashion, one arrives at an astounding figure. German fashions today ought to put all considerations behind that of patriotism. They ought to consider first of all how we are to economize our small stocks of raw materials."

By the new method, it is claimed, the soap produced is not only fine and delicate, but it acts as efficiently in salt water as in fresh—a fact that may make the soap valuable for the navy.
