Grout, ex-comptroller of New York and Brooklyn's first borough president, was sentenced yesterday to an indefinite term in prison, not less than one nor more than two years' imprisonment at hard labor in Sing Sing. He was convicted of perjury in signing a false statement of the condition of the Union bank of which he was president.

GREAT THINGS IN "MACK" M'GEE IS SET AT LIBERTY

Extension of Rails to Sanish Means Big Prospects For District. Non-appearance of Man who Escaped With Broken Skull is Cause.

Great things are being accomplished in the district between Plaza and Sanish, on the new Soo railroad, the construction of which has just been completed. Within a few weeks regular train service will be established on this, one of the very few new railroad projects promoted in the northwest this year.

Lawrence Feetham and Walter Schlosser of Grand Forks, who have just completed a trip over most of the new line, are home with glowing accounts of what may be expected in that district. Van Hook, the largest town on the new line, is booming in great shape. Sanish, with the rails laid into the town less than a week, is a real frontier town. Its buildings are unpainted, and are built on "fills" for the townsite has not yet been definitely located. Temporarily, the town is located close to the Missouri river, between two high bluffs. The government will determine upon the townsite location. The town is on the Ft. Berthold reservation. Very fine crops are expected in the entire district. This fact has enthused the business men and farmers, and they are confident that things will boom in great shape during the coming year.

Van Hook is just now laying plans for a big festival which will be held August 10 and 11. The business men are spending \$1,500 in making the two day affair a complete success. There will be eight baseball games, the Mitchell band, an aeroplane flight, and many other strong features.

The case of Mack McGee, colored, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, was dismissed by Justice of the Peace P. McLoughlin this morning and the prisoner set at liberty. This action was taken owing to the failure of the authorities to find any trace of James Welch, white, McGee's alleged victim, who escaped from a local hospital while suffering from a fractured skull some time last Saturday. McGee, who is alleged to have knocked down Welch with an iron bar, fracturing the man's skull, was all smiles this morning when he learned that the charge was to be dropped and that he was to be allowed to go free. According to the authorities, Welch did not wish to prosecute the man who attacked him. The injured man maintained, it is said, that he had no one to blame but himself, because he had "no right to mix with that class of people."

REV. THOMPSON HAS FINE TRIP Local Pastor Enthusiastic Over Magnificent Scenery in the Rockies and Spirit of Progress in West.

Rev. A. H. Thompson, pastor of the First Methodist church, who with Mrs. Thompson has returned from an extensive tour of the western states, reports that in his opinion there is no grander sight than that offered by a trip through the Canadian Rockies. He said he had impressed him wonderfully with its magnificent sweeps of mountainous scenery, its strong commercial life and its progressive spirit, and added that much of the California scenery was beautiful beyond description, but in talking of the trip, Dr. Thompson reiterated that in his opinion nothing could equal the majesty and beauty of the western Canada mountains.

The exposition at San Diego while neither as large nor as complete in many ways as that wonderful display of international exhibits at the Panama-Pacific fair still is more beautiful in its architecture, said Dr. Thompson. We were wonderfully impressed with the climatic advantages of the southern California climate. We met a number of Grand Forks people enroute, some returning and others going out to the great fairs, and the anticipation of the newcomers was inevitably heightened by the pictures drawn by those who had been over the road. We had a good time, but are glad to be back in Grand Forks once more," said Mr. Thompson, "and while we were tired in one sense of the word we were greatly refreshed by the trip."
