ALLEGED THIEF UP TOMORROW Fred Johnson, Accused of Robbing Traveler, to be Up Tuesday.

Fred Johnson, arrested in East Grand Forks Saturday evening as a suspect in the robbery of Victor Remior, an Amery, Wis., man, who was on his way to Voss, N. D., where he was engaged to work for a farmer during the harvesting season, will be arraigned tomorrow morning before Judge Rasmussen. In the meanwhile he is being held for thirty days on the charge of vagrancy until the robbery charge can be investigated. Remior claims that he fell asleep on the Northern Pacific flyer on the way from Minneapolis to Voss, N. D., and that he had hung his hat and coat containing \$30 on a hook over his head, but did not think to place his money in his pants pocket. He fell asleep at Crookston, and according to his story was robbed between that place and this city. He did not discover his loss until the conductor had awakened him after he had passed Grand Forks and asked for his train check. Some one on the train told Remior that they had seen two men take his coat and hat and get off at East Grand Forks. Remior came back to this city on the next train and reported the robbery to the police of both cities, with the result that Johnson was arrested. The coat and hat were found in the possession of Johnson, but the \$30 was not to be found.

TWO MEN GIVEN THIRTY DAYS

William Richardson and Frank DuFrame Draw Thirty Days in Municipal Court.

William Richardson, arraigned this morning before Municipal Judge Rasmussen, was given thirty days in the county jail on the charge of drunkenness.
