GERMAN MINISTER DOES NOT REPLY. London, Aug. 21.—Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent sends a dispatch received there from Berlin which says that Gottlieb von Jagow, the German foreign minister, declined to reply yesterday in the Reichstag to the question of Dr. Karl Liebknecht, one of the socialist leaders, whether the government was disposed to abandon its idea of the annexation of conquered territory and enter into immediate negotiations for peace.

Galata Bridge IMPORTANT ONE. Athens, Aug. 21.—The Galata bridge at Constantinople which has been an object of British submarine and aeroplane attacks, is the chief of two bridges which cross the Golden Horn and connect Galata with Stamboul. The bridge was completed by German contractors in 1912 and replaced by iron on an old wooden structure by which connection was maintained between these two important quarters of the capital. The bridge was constructed in such a way that certain sections can be opened in order to allow vessels to pass into the inner and naval ports of the city.
