and at the same time secure the necessary recognition of the rights of our people. If, to secure those rights, the severance of friendly relations is necessary, that must be done.

At this moment it appears likely that the present crisis will be lided over. The German government has asked for time to ascertain the facts in the Arabic case, and has intimated, though not directly stated, that if the Arabic was sunk without provocation and without warning by a German submarine, the act was performed in violation of orders, and that satisfactory reparation will be made.

If this is done the result will be highly satisfactory, for it will mean the abandonment by Germany of that portion of her submarine warfare which has resulted in the loss of American lives, and which most certainly could not have been continued without embroiling the two countries.

THE SACKVILLE-WEST INCIDENT. The charges of improper activity in American affairs by representatives of the German government recalls an incident now almost forgotten, which terminated the career of a British ambassador to the United States.

In 1888 Sir Lionel Sackville-West was the British ambassador at Washington. In October of that year, while the presidential campaign was at its hottest, the ambassador received a letter from a man named Murchison, who said that he was a naturalized American citizen of English birth, and that because of his continued interest in the mother country, he desired to vote in such a manner as would best promote her interests.

Sir Lionel was greatly shocked a few days later to find that the Murchison letter and his own reply were published in every paper in the country, with columns of indignant comment at the presumption of the representative of a foreign government undertaking to advise an American citizen in the performance of his political duties.

Sir Lionel was only one of several men who had been selected by Murchison as victims, or rather, as instruments in the manufacture of political capital, for he was not ill apparently, against the ambassador or any of his other correspondents.

There was, of course, no suspicion at any time that the advice of Sackville-West had been inspired by his government. Undoubtedly, had the British government known of the matter, it would have advised its representative to drop it like a hot horseshoe. It was simply a case in which an able man, and a gentleman, forgot his good sense and committed an act of unaccountable folly.
