SMALL DAMAGE DUE TO FROST
Garden Vegetables Worst Hurt—Grain is Not Damaged at All.
Very little damage has been done in Polk county on account of the heavy frosts the last few nights. Most of the wheat, barley and oats have already been cut and were not damaged at all, most of the harm being done to the garden vegetables and corn to a slight extent.
According to James Connell, a prominent farmer living near Crookston, who spent the day in East Grand Forks, garden vegetables in that section of the county were badly damaged, cucumbers and tomatoes being the most affected. Corn is also slightly hurt near that city, but is not damaged so that it cannot be used for feed this fall.
