TANNER INDICTED ON PERJURY CHARGE

St. Louis, Mo., Sept. 17.—Thirty minutes after it had begun an investigation into the activities of an alleged

arson syndicate, the grand jury yesterday indicted Louis C. Tanner, secretary of the Ehrhardt Wall Paper and Decorating company on a charge of perjury. Tanner was arrested on a bench warrant yesterday. Officials at the municipal courts building said they expected the indictment of at least ten other persons.

BANK CASHIER IS TO BE SENTENCED

Danville, Ill., Sept. 17.—Oliver A. Harker, cashier of the First National bank of Johnson City, Ill., was yesterday found guilty in the federal court of making false entries to the extent of \$10,000. He will be sentenced later.

LARGEST DAIRY CONCERNS AFFILIATE

London, Sept. 17.—An amalgamation of the three largest dairy companies in England has just been effected here. The new corporation, to be known as the United Dairies, has a capital of \$5,000,000 and will control

the bulk of the trade of London and the surrounding district. According to the big dairy men, the combination was made necessary by the strength of the farmers' organizations, which fix the wholesale price which the dairy companies must pay for milk. These farmers' societies, which are banded together in a strong central body, have recently been considering radical changes in the milk contracts, and their delegates will meet this month to fix the wholesale prices for the coming twelve months. It is expected that they will fix a figure that will give the farmer a generous profit; according to current reports, the price determined upon is 29 cents to 33 cents per gallon—practically 1 cent per quart wholesale. As the average cost for retailing is a little more than 3 cents a quart, this will necessitate the retailer charging 13 cents a quart, a rise of 1 cent over the previous winter price of 8 cents.

ARRESTED WITH QUANTITY OF BOOZE

Langdon, N. D., Sept. 17.—A transient thresher, McDonald, who has been around Langdon since the season's work started about two weeks ago, but who appears to have been unable to find a job to suit him was placed under arrest by Jim Reed, the chief of police, and given a hearing before Justice Power upon a charge of selling "boozie." His actions since that coming to the town had caused the authorities to suspect that he was furnishing some of the liquor which the transient thresher element was imbibing. When arrested his stock consisted of a suit case of pint bottles of whiskey in addition to which several more flasks were found upon his person. He will appear before Judge Kneeshaw for sentence, having entered a plea of guilty at his hearing.
