L. W. W. WORKER IS GIVEN JAIL TERM

Suitcase Thief is also Given a Ninety Day Sentence in County Jail.

Martin Rutkowski, arrested yesterday afternoon by Officer Iver Aldahl on the charge of stealing a suitcase from a Pole, pleaded guilty to the charge when in municipal court this morning before Judge Rasmussen, and was sentenced to ninety days at hard labor in the county jail.

Alex Johnson, an L. W. W. organizer, was arrested yesterday while in the act of "beating up" a companion who had signified his intention of going to work for a farmer, and would not accept a dollar from Johnson, which was offered him to stay away from work. A large number of L. W. W. cards and assessment slips were found in his possession when arrested.

When arraigned before Judge Rasmussen this morning, he pleaded guilty to the charge of disorderly conduct, and was sentenced to forty days in the county jail at hard labor. He became vicious, however, and was given an additional thirty days for contempt of court. After receiving the limit of ninety days, he asked for seven months, and was given a promise by the judge of another jail sentence on reappearing in East Grand Forks on the completion of his sentence.

Dick Smith, a transient arrested on the charge of drunkenness, was sentenced to thirty days in the county jail, and had his sentence suspended on solemnly swearing to the judge to put my two fingers up, I go to work." When last seen, he was quickly disappearing down the road leading north from the city.

Seven other prisoners, arraigned this morning on charges of vagrancy and drunkenness, were given suspended sentences on condition they leave the city.
