GRAND JURY TO HEAR THE STORY

Hearing in Municipal Court is Waived by the Defendant.

Treacy, charged with manslaughter in the second degree, today waived examination in the local municipal court, and his case goes to the Polk county grand jury.

ONLY ONE WEEK FOR WET FORCES

Preparations Being Made for Care for the Finish.

Just one week from tomorrow night at 11 o'clock, the cry of "11 o'clock, all out," will be heard for the last time, and at about 5 minutes past 11, the last sad march across the ruby red by way of the DeMers avenue bridge will be begun.

In many instances, it is expected that a great deal of assistance will be required by some of the persons in the line of march. Preparations are being made by the police of both sides of the river, however, for the reception of those who have been over-indulgent on the last night.

Many of the saloon men will remain in the city after the county option law goes into effect, going into some other line of business. Most of the wholesale houses, however, will move their entire stocks to St. Paul, where they will continue their trade.

Other lines of business will remain much the same as formerly, continuing in their old locations.

SLEEPER BREAKS JAIL WINDOWS


Asked for Bed for the Night, but is Found Digging a Hole Thru the Wall.
